175 years ago, on October 8, the German protestants in Richmond held their first worship service. That became the founding of our church. In the last 175 years, St John's has had four denominational identities and four buildings. Our name has changed through the years as our identify has become more welcoming to people who do not identify as German. Our building has moved to accommodate congregational capacity and community diversity.

One thing as you read St John's history, it often struggled with stewardship. The founders coming from a German state church background were not use to having to support their own church. Something we still struggle with today.

The first building, which we do not have a picture of, was a side by side two family house at 412-414 East Marshall Street. It was rented for \$150 a year and remolded to be a worship space for \$9. This is where St John's first worship service took place.

On October 7th we will celebrate that humble beginning with our **175th Anniversary Worship**. We will top off a weekend of celebration with the *Reunion Happy Hour* from 5 pm to 7 pm on Friday, October 5th and the *German Dinner* on Saturday, October 6th with seating from 5:30 pm to 7:30 pm. I encourage everyone to be part of this celebratory weekend and spread the news.

Our month of October will not end with the celebration but will continue with a visit from Canine Companions during church on the 14th, the Women's Retreat October 19 - 21 and Stewardship breakfast at 9AM on October 28th. Please plan to be here as we adjust to the new realities of using our parking deck and shuttle we need everyone to continue to support the church and be active in our community. We are not closing any of our ministry just learning new ways to do it.

Church Council met for the monthly meeting on Monday, September 10, 2018.



Trustee Report – working on agreement regarding the alley parking easement which will allow parking the alley spaces to remain with building if the church building is sold. Once an agreement is met, the closing should be a week or two after. The Renovation Group (formerly Parking Lot Ad Hoc Committee) is looking into HVAC recommendations that will meet the historic tax credit requirements. Agreements have been entered into with a tax credit consultant and an LLC attorney. The Trustees will hire an accountant for the LLC and also hire an architect.

Finance Report – Jeff Hetzer presented the 2019 Ministry Plan. It is an operational budget and not a capital outlay budget. The proposed 2019

Budget shows a deficit of \$184,000 and Council will need to request the \$85,000 gift from Endowment and possibly a loan to cover the remaining deficit. Finance presented the budget to Council to review for questions or suggestions.

An investment account has been established for receiving stocks as a gift or to pay a pledge. A money market account has been established to receive the parking lot sale proceeds and will be used for building renovations. The money market account will be managed by the Trustees. The church has been using the gift from Helen Karnap to pay bills and expenses. Council will request the gift amount from Endowment when ready to determine best way to honor Helen's memory. Endowment is expected to honor June Sullen's memory as well.

175th Anniversary – Invitations have been sent. There will be a happy hour Friday night from 5-7. Council members will provide snacks. GermanFest will be on Saturday with dinner beginning at 5:30. The band will play from 6-8. Tickets will be available beginning September 16. David Agee will take tickets Saturday night. The Sunday service will be worship beginning at 10:00. Former ministers have been invited and some will participate in the service. The interim conference minister will preach. A jazz band will be present. A poster showing opportunities for giving to support the church will be displayed throughout the weekend.

Committee Updates

Worship and Music – The committee recommends leaving the worship start time at 10:00 and evaluating after the first of the year. There is no full time choir but there will be individual singers as in summer.

Mission and Outreach – Pridefest is Saturday, September 22 at Brown's Island. We are hosting a booth with First Congregational and Restoration Fellowship. Members of the committee are visiting the organizations supported by our monthly mission. T-shirts will be available beginning September 16. All are encouraged to wear them when we are working together in the community. Neighbors in Need offering will be collected October 7.

Facilities – Exit signs and emergency lights have new batteries. Outside lights have been replaced. The first floor restroom is being renovated. Painting is ongoing.

Congregational Life and Care - Women's Retreat in October. SJCP's Holiday Cabaret is on December 8, PALs concert on December 15 and the Christmas Tea on December 23.

New Business

Reviewed a proposal from Restoration Fellowship to use our Sanctuary and building the 2nd and 4th Wednesday evenings each month for worship. They seek access to the Sanctuary, restrooms, audio equipment, and instruments. Council will invite Pastor Lacette Cross to meet with us to discuss before committing to this use. Jeff Jacobs will draft a use agreement.

New Beginnings

Council reviewed the information from New Beginnings and decided to table further discussion until February 2019.

<u>Motions</u>

Minutes – August 13, 2018 approved with revision – added Rob Osborne and Jeff Jacobs as guests. Approved a called Congregational Meeting for December 2, 2018 to approve the 2019 budget.

As our 175th Anniversary approaches, we are like busy bees getting ready for the event – sprucing up the building, making apple sauce and apple cakes for the German dinner, and reaching out to any and all who have been part of the St. John's Church community. Your Worship and Music Committee has also been busy planning a special worship service for the occasion. Our Anniversary worship on October 7th just happens to fall on World Communion Sunday which is a very special Sunday in the life of the church... reminding us of how important it is that we embrace the UCC Gospel-inspired motto "that they may all be one." [John 17:21]

We are blessed to have as our guest preacher, The Rev. Roddy Dunkerson who is currently the Acting Conference Minister of the Central Atlantic Conference of the United Church of Christ. Rev. Dunkerson retired as Conference Minister of the Nebraska UCC Conference after 15 years of service in that position. His last years were given to helping work out the uniting of the Nebraska, Iowa and South Dakota Conferences into a shared regional conference. In addition to his gifts of listening and consensus building, Rev. Dunkerson is well versed in world and church history and his sermon message for us is entitled: "The Dance Between Tradition and Creating a New Future."

We are extremely fortunate to have the **Russell Wilson Trio** as our musical guests performing throughout our worship service on October 7th. This jazz trio is Russell Wilson, pianist, Matt Gold, bassist and Billy Williams, drummer. Here are a few snippets of info about these phenomenal local musicians:

Russell Wilson is an outstanding classical and jazz pianist, He is formerly a member of the Smithsonian Jazz Masterworks Orchestra, the Joe Kennedy Quartet, the faculty of Virginia Union's University and Virginia State University. Currently he is a piano instructor at VCU and serves as pianist for worship services at Second Baptist Church and Crown and Joy. Wilson enjoys a distinguished career as a solo and chamber music performer and is the principal pianist of the Richmond Symphony Orchestra. As a recording artist, he is featured on "Moonlight Piano" and "The Memphis Convention." During the summer of 1995, he became pianist for the Smithsonian Jazz Masterworks Orchestra conducted by David Baker and Gunther Schuller. He received the Theresa Pollak Award for excellence in the arts in 2002.

A native of Virginia Beach, **Billy Williams**, began playing drums at the age of 10 at the Brotherly Love Church of God in Christ in Norfolk, VA where his grandfather was Pastor and his mother was Minister of Music. The foundations of building a life that was Christ-centered shaped Billy's outlook on the power of music. The life long lessons of music Ministry, humility and professionalism learned during this time would also prove to be very vital to his career.

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A graduate of VCU, Billy has had the opportunity to travel the world extensively as a performer and educator. He has performed at Carnegie Hall, Jazz at Lincoln Center, and the Village Vanguard in NYC; the Kennedy Center and Blues Alley in Washington, DC, and prestigious venues in Paris, Amsterdam, London, Stockholm, Copenhaven, Berlin, Bern, Bologna, Vienna, and Qatar. As an educator, Billy has been featured as a Jazz Studies Artist-in-Residence at Duke University, the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire, Jazz STL in St. Louis and at the Governor's School for the Arts in Norfolk, VA.

Since the age of 9, **Matt Gold** has loved making music with his double bass. His formal training began with John Chiego at the University of Memphis where he was awarded a full scholarship. He later went on to earn a Masters Degree in Music Performance at Indiana University, studying under world-renowned bass teacher, Lawrence Hurst. While at IU, Matt also had the privilege of working with Bruce Bransby, former Principal Bass of the Los Angeles Philharmonic, and Stanley Richie, a legend in the world of baroque music.

Matt has been a tenured member of the Memphis Symphony Orchestra, and has played with the Louisiana Philharmonic and Virginia Symphony Orchestras. Nowadays, he can frequently be seen on stage at Richmond's Carpenter Theatre with the Richmond Symphony. Matt has always had a strong interest in a variety of eclectic styles. In high school, he began rock and jazz lessons on guitar and studied jazz bass at the University of Memphis with Tim Goodwin. Matt has also taken composition lessons from Prix de Rome winner Kamran Ince. He currently plays his double bass in Goldrush, a Richmond-based rock band which also features his wife, Treesa Gold on violin.

In addition to performing, Matt also teaches at the College of William & Mary and the Omaha Conservatory of Music Institute, alongside a very successful studio of private bass students. When he is not making music, he loves exploring the Earth with his wife and daughter, Kit.

In addition to Rev. Dunkerson and the jazz musicians, our worship will be led by former Pastors and clergy associated with St. John's. We are in for a special, joyful, spirit-filled time to praise God and give thanks for the ministry and mission of this church.

Because Justice



Have you ever seen a person in a wheelchair with a service dog and wonder "What an amazing animal! How did it get trained?" Are you an animal lover? A dog owner? If so you are not alone.

In the US alone there are approximately 90 million dogs living in households, up from 68 million in 2000. Dogs are amazing pets, constantly loving unconditionally their owners and families. Let me introduce you to Canine Companions for Independence.

CCI is a volunteer organization devoted to breeding, training, and providing service animals for folks with all kinds of disabilities. Started in 1975, they have been providing assistance dogs for over 3,500 folks who need help to feel less isolated, more independent and worthy in the world. I discovered CCI when one of the patients I serve in my job got her first assistant dog a few months ago. Natalie is 11 years old with spina bifida who is wheelchair dependent. When her mother told me she was getting a companion dog I was first introduced to the concept of service dogs helping wheelchair dependent folks. Natalie's life has changed dramatically as a result of her new companion: she has more freedom, friends and is less dependent on her parents, something a pre-teen craves. Because of the impact on Natalie's life and my love of dogs I asked mom where they got the dog, and was told about Canine Companions. I looked them up online and discovered, while the recipient pays nothing, the breeding, training, feeding, housing, veterinarian care, amount to \$45,000 per animal. All this is covered through volunteers, donations, and corporate sponsorship.

Here's where St. John's comes in. On October 14, Canine Companions will be in worship and fellowship with us. They will share their story during Children's Moment, and be available for additional conversation during Coffee Hour. While we may be a small congregation we have a big heart and most of us are either dog owners or animal lovers. We all subscribe to "Love your neighbor as yourself" and we all love our pets. Be as generous as your heart and pocketbook will allow this month for this wonderful, helpful and amazing organization.
