Our October Mission of the Month:

ACTS – Area Congregations Together in Service

ACTS was founded by a core group of five Richmond area churches, including St. John's, who came together with an idea to combine, streamline, and coordinate prevention services for those who were just "one step away from homelessness" and who often showed up on congregations' doorsteps seeking help.

Today ACTS works in cooperation with more than 60 area congregations and other partner organizations throughout Richmond and the surrounding counties that refer families and hard-working individuals who for one reason or another find themselves unable to make ends meet. They are people who need financial and other assistance to get through their financial crisis and in many cases are not eligible for other financial resources. Often, they face the threat of eviction because of the situation they find themselves in. Trained case managers on the ACTS staff contact each referral and after an initial phone conversation will arrange a meeting with eligible clients during which their needs and solutions are discussed in depth.

In 2018 ACTS received 1,252 referrals and assisted 1,154 households.

Please join us during the service on October 13, when Billy Poarch, ACTS' Chief Executive Officer, will be with us to discuss its mission and activities.

We encourage you to support this vital organization. Checks should be made out to St. John's UCC, mark the memo line with ACTS. Cash should be put either into the pails on the 1st Sunday or into a blue mission envelope.



World Communion Sunday Neighbors in Need Special Mission Offering October 6th

John 13:34-35


A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another.

When the rich young ruler asked Jesus, "Who is my neighbor?" Jesus responded with the parable of the Good Samaritan, a man who was scored by the community for his beliefs yet it was this man who helped a stranger who was in peril and put him back on the road to recovery, at his own expense.

Our neighbors are everywhere, next door, around the block, down the road, and across the globe.

Neighbors in Need (NIN) is a special mission offering of the United Church of Christ that supports ministries of justice and compassion throughout the United States. One-third of NIN funds support the <u>Council for</u> <u>American Indian Ministry</u> (CAIM). Two-thirds of this offering is used by the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries (JWM) to support a variety of justice initiatives, advocacy efforts, and direct service projects through grants. Neighbors in Need grants are awarded to UCC churches and organizations doing justice work in their communities. These grants fund projects whose work ranges from direct service to community organizing and advocacy to address systemic injustice. This year, special consideration will be given to projects focusing on serving our immigrant neighbors and communities.

We are so grateful to everyone who has volunteered to participate in some way to make our Sunday worship and fellowship time welcoming, meaningful and enjoyable. We thank the Welcome Teams, Altar Guild volunteers, sound and video technicians, choir members, liturgists, coffee hour hosts, those who have shared in a mission or stewardship moment and those who are "game" to take an extemporaneous role in a worship script. For those who may be new to the St. John's Community, we want you to know that none of the above in that long list of ways to join in is closed to anyone. > Museum of the Bible Trip Saturday, November 16th





First English Lutheran invites St. John's UCC to visit the Museum of the Bible in Washington, D.C. The bus will depart at 8 a.m. and will return at 7 p.m. Once arriving, a guided tour is included that will focus on what there is to see on each floor. The museum has thousands of biblical artifacts and texts, one of the largest collections in the world. You will also have a rare opportunity to view a new exhibit, the <u>Tapestry of Light: Intersections of Illuminations</u> by Dr. Irene Barberis, artist. This immense 100-foot tapestry, shows six different images of St. John's Apocalypse as a means to convey hope in a troubled world. Incorporating nanotechnology, it is woven with luminescent, fluorescent, and phosphorescent fibers.

The cost is \$90 per person which includes bus transportation, admission to the Museum of the Bible and tour, and driver gratuity.
