Notes from Pastor Jim

During a recent Wednesday prayer meeting, someone mentioned to God about his weakness. His prayer echoed Paul's by saying, "When I am weak, then I am strong" (2 Cor. 12:10). These were timely words for me. For you see, I am all too aware of my weaknesses, I struggle with and perceive them to be hindrances in my desire to be of service to Father. On this particular day, I was preoccupied by my weaknesses so much I felt like a useless piece of equipment. This individual's embracing of his weaknesses and the Spirit's prompting caused me to reconsider my weaknesses.

There is no definitive idea of what Paul's weakness was. Based on His comments in Galatians 4:15 and 6:11, some suggest he may have suffered from an eye condition. Others, referencing 1 Corinthians 2:3-5, propose Paul suffered from some debilitating disease, i.e. malaria, etc. Whatever his situation, Paul related to it as "a thorn in the flesh, a messenger of Satan to torment me."

Of his "thorn," Paul acknowledged two things that affected him directly and daily. First, his condition was inconvenient in the least and downright debilitating at worst. It was an uncomfortable reminder, an impediment, to effective service. It held him back. He couldn't do the things he wanted. He couldn't go as fast or as far, or accomplish all that his heart desired. Paul viewed this "thorn" as an obstacle to serving Jesus.

Second, his "thorn" left him feeling mocked, belittled, and ridiculed. Whatever his impediment was, Satan exploited it to belittle and discourage Paul. His weakness was a discomforting reminder that Paul was not what he wanted to be. Like a pebble in his shoe, it slowed Paul down and gave him reason to question himself.

However Paul viewed this matter, God allowed it in order that He would be glorified. In allowing Paul to be slowed down, handicapped, situations were created where wondrous things were associated with an obviously incapable individual. In his weakness, Paul was a living, breathing five loaves and two fishes used to feed over 5,000 people (Matt. 14:13-21).

Paul admits that apart from this "thorn," there would have been the danger of him becoming arrogant, prideful, and full of himself. Instead, hobbled as he was, there was little danger of Paul thinking he was responsible for anything associated with him. Paul's weakness left no doubt that what took place was all Father's doing.

Since we tend to find our value in our perception of ourselves, it's hard to accept our weaknesses. That's why Satan used Paul's condition against him. But, eventually, Paul accepted that a weakened state provides God room to manifest His grace (enabling power). This results in God Himself getting the glory.

Therefore, Paul embraced his weaknesses. He came to understand that when he was weak, unable to carry the entire load, incapable of accomplishing what God wanted to do, that he was in the position God wanted. For in the situation God would make Himself known.

Me, I am working on it. Like Paul, I desire that God be seen and honored. If it takes me looking like a weakling for this to be, then by His grace I'll learn to accept it.

Notes from the Associate Pastor Harry

I was reading through some of my past articles and thought I'd update this one from 2019 and resend it because the message is still so true and one we need to remember.

While October is known for a particular well-known day at the end of the month that allows both candymakers and dentists to stay in business for another year, in 2024 you may also see that on the 12th is the last of the Jewish High Holy days known as Yom Kippur or the Day of Atonement. The central themes of the day are atonement and repentance. Judaism recognizes that everybody sins on occasion, but that people can stop or minimize those occasions in the future by repenting for past transgressions. Thus, the primary purpose of repentance in Judaism is ethical self-transformation.

The good news for people, though, is that the Day of Atonement has already happened. It occurred a little over two thousand years ago when the perfect lamb sacrifice was given for all of the sins of mankind for all time. Jesus completed the atonement for your sin and mine when, as the only sinless man to ever live, he died and bore the punishment for our sin. 1 John 2:2 "He is the atoning sacrifice for our sins, and not only for ours but also for the sins of the whole world." (NIV) We don't have to keep doing a temporary cover year after year. All we have to do is accept that payment for the cost of our sin.

As to repentance though, we are never looking to self-transformation because most of us have tried that at one time or another, often with those failed New Year's resolutions, and failed miserably.

As Christians, we know that repentance is agreeing with God's position on the sins that so often creep into our lives, to confess them to God who already knows about them and to live in and by His power so that we don't return to them. 1 John 1:9 – "If we confess our sins, He is faithful and righteous to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness." When God makes us clean there's not a spot to be found.

So, this October when you see that notation on your calendar about Yom Kippur take that time to remember that the Day of Atonement has already happened for you. Let it also remind you to remember what that means in your life and be thankful to God for it. And finally, let it also remind you to regularly be in a position of repentance as you seek to live a life that is for God's honor and glory. Even if you overeat some of the candy that may appear in your house after the Harvest Festival night of fun and frivolity.

Notes from the Youth Team

Friday-Sunday, September 20th-22nd, 13 of our students and 3 adult leaders attended the DNow (Disciple Now) Conference held at Avondale Baptist Church along with several other church youth groups. It was an amazing weekend full of music, Bible teaching, games, food, and fellowship. We all had a great time and want to go back next year.

One of the things that's built into DNow weekends is an opportunity for mission outreach. We had the privilege of serving at the Phoenix Resource Center at 27th Avenue and Augusta in north Phoenix. They are one of three Community Resource Centers in the Valley supervised by Arizona Baptist Children's Services (ABCS): Casa de Amor in Mesa, Rio Vista Center in south Phoenix, and the one where we served.

ABCS ministries focus on providing practical help to meet physical, emotional and spiritual needs. "Our goal is to share the love of Christ with each person we come in contact with." These Resource Centers are one of the ways that they meet those needs. Each one of these ministers to people who our culture would classify as "the least of these": low-income families, homeless, underserved, etc. They are on the frontlines of ministry. Along with food and clothing distribution, each Center also houses a New Life Pregnancy Center that offers diapers and other supplies, counseling, and parenting classes. Each Center also has a Bridge church on campus that partners with ABCS to provide for the needs in their community.

Our students have had the opportunity to serve in Mesa and south Phoenix, so I was excited that they got to serve at the third Center on Saturday. Because these Centers run on a very limited budget and respond to a very large amount of need, the men and women who serve there live with the constant expectation that God will provide – and He does. And that's one reason I like to have our students serve at these Centers; because it's very obvious that this is God's ministry, done God's way. through God's provision.

Ephesians 2:10 tells us that God has prepared good works for us to do. As believers, we're meant to share what God has given to us, physically and spiritually. In the movie, "Free Burma Rangers", Dave Eubanks says, "Go to the sound of need. And trust God to show you how you can be useful." Serving at one of these Resource Centers is a great way to share the gospel and be the hands and feet of Jesus. As a church, we serve at Rio Vista Center several times a year, but you can serve there individually, also.




Notes from the Worship Leader

Hello, Church Family I thought I would give you an update on Adventure Club that started on September 4th. We started that first night with 37 kids signed up, added 6 more that night, and now have a total of 51 signed up. So far at least 45 have attended each night. While the first week was rather chaotic, we are slowly getting into the routine.

This is what a typical night looks like for our leaders and kids:

5:55pm - Leaders meet in one of the classrooms to pray for the night.

6:00 pm - Leaders start signing the kids in, take their satchel, and send them to room 4 to start Music. After Music is over, the little kids (3 yr - 5 yr old) are excused and go back to their classroom for the rest of the night.

6:30 pm - The older kids (6 - 11 year olds) are given an opportunity to get a drink of water and use the rest rooms before coming back to room 4 for "teaching" time.

7:00 pm - The older kids go out to games. After games is over they come back in, and **7:30 pm** - They go to their "small group" classrooms to say last week's verse and Central Truth to their table leader and review the material they had just learned earlier that night for the next week. Then they are dismissed and picked up by parents.

Every week for 5 weeks the kids get a new Central Truth and Memory Verse to study. On week 6 they will review the 5 previous Central Truths and Memory Verses and they will have an opportunity to earn a new Pin.

This week is week 5 so I am looking forward to how our first review night will go. We are still looking for Volunteers. If anyone is interested, let me know.
