Notes from Pastor Jim

"Who will separate us from the love of Christ? Will tribulation, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword? Just as it is written, 'For Your sake we are being put to death all day long; We were considered as sheep to be slaughtered.' (Psalm 44:22) But in all these things we overwhelmingly conquer through Him who loved us." (Romans 8:35-37)

Nobody likes trouble. Most folks desire a life of peace and calm. We perceive difficulties as something to be avoided. When hardships are encountered, people tend to believe something has gone wrong.

For the disciple of Jesus, there is the added thought that maybe, in some way, God is displeased. Internal questions begin to be asked. Have I done something wrong? Am I being punished? Is God mad at me? Given the earthly life we know, these questions are natural. Natural, that is, to human behavior and experience.

The first fact disciples must embrace is that God is not as we are, human. He does not act or react as we have experienced in this life. He is not flawed and sin-filled. He is perfect. His nature and, therefore, His actions are characterized by love (1 John 4:8).

Second, this sin-dominated world hates God. It also hates His people. This is why Paul cites Psalm 44:22. Jesus also asserted this fact (John 15:18-25). As followers of Jesus, we must accept that as Jesus was hated and acted against; people, the world system, and the "prince of the power of the air" (Eph. 2:2) will also act against His saints.

This is Paul's point to the believers in Rome. People tend to look at life events and imply Who God is or what He is doing from what we see. In backwards fashion, we attempt to deduce Who God is based on what is taking place. Instead, Jesus' people need to begin with Who God is: to accept that He acts in a manner that is consistent with His nature, and then, and only then, attempt to make sense of life.

Ella Fitzgerald's song said, "Into each life some rain must fall," That rain and the accompanying wind, lightning, thunder, and potential flooding, comes upon the just and the unjust (Matt. 5:45). We live in a fallen world. As Jesus-followers, we sin and we live in a world of people who sin. This all results in an abundance of problems. Some of our own making. Some as a result of others.

But in the midst of this Paul asserts that "nothing," absolutely "nothing" (notice how Paul's list of distresses goes from the simple, "tribulation" to the severe "sword," death?), separates disciples of Jesus from God's love and commitment. Because of God's love and dedication to love and His people, the disciples of Jesus are not abandoned but, instead, are overcomers.

Let Who God is influence your view of life. Not the other way around.

Hello, Laveen Baptist Church. September (until recently) was always the back-to-school month but, also, the traditional start of apple season and the fall season. Due to our global economy, we can now get apples all year long. Of course, the ubiquitous apple (erroneously) also has a place in the Adam and Eve story in the Garden of Eden, but apples are an amazing fruit.

The old adage of 'an apple a day keeps the doctor away' actually has some truth to it. Even though apples are mainly composed of carbs and water, due to their high fiber and polyphenol counts, these fruits often have a low GI (glycemic index) score which makes them a good weight-loss-friendly food. They're also a good source of vitamin C and potassium. And I haven't even mentioned that they're simply delicious. Globally, there are around 7,500 different varieties, which means that there's probably an apple variety that appeals to everyone.

This is just one of the trees that God designed that 'bears fruit with seed' which God placed in creation. God's design in nature for the welfare of mankind is incredible and certainly not boring. Now, consider that in the book of Revelation we read that God is going to make a new heaven and earth (chap. 21). I for one can hardly wait for that: to be like Adam and Eve before the fall with all kinds of fruit -bearing trees that God designed. Now I know that it can be hard to keep our focus on that future when the present times can seem so difficult and out-of-control. But when I do then I have found that it makes the current difficulties, whatever they are, much more bearable. I know that that time is coming because I have God's word that it is, and He's never failed to keep his promises.

So, if your kids engage in the age-old practice of taking the teacher an apple, it's a way of ensuring their good health, but, more importantly, it's a way of sharing and reminding us that God is the source of all of our provisions. And, when we take in what God's designed for us, it's for our good and our enjoyment. When you're in the store and see that big bin of apples, give God thanks for what He's done for you.

Both men were skeptics when it came to Jesus Christ and who He claimed to be. Both men did extensive research hoping to disprove His claims, but, in fact, proved just the opposite. 
