Greetings Woke Family,

Happy Black History month! I used to feel slighted that we were given the month with the fewest days to celebrate our heritage. As time went on, I took on a different perspective.......

You can't have American history without Black history, so we should be celebrating our heritage and greatness EVERY month!

We celebrate the Civil Rights Movement of the 1960s, however, there is still much work to do. The Voting Rights Act of 1965 has been stripped down so much by the Supreme Court, that it is hardly recognizable. We must use our vote to elect Congress people and Senators who are sympathetic to our cause and will commit to passing the resolution to get the Voting Rights Act and George Floyd Bills passed. This is not something that a president can do by his/herself.

Unfortunately, there are many efforts here in Georgia to erase our contributions and significance in the building of this country. Bills that allow for black history to be removed from the curriculum in the classroom, banning books about slavery, firing teachers, and cancelling funding to schools that are accused of teaching critical race theory are just a few. Despite these efforts, we continue to rise. From 2020 until now, here in Georgia, we have elected the first African American Senator (Raphael Warnock) and the first Jewish Senator (Jon Ossoff). We have also witnessed the appointment of the first African American female Supreme Court Associate Justice (Ketanji Brown Jackson). This could not have been accomplished without your vote!

As we kick-off this election cycle, I implore you not to become apathetic. In 2016, less than half of registered African Americans voted. Our performance improved in 2018 but unfortunately not enough to elect the first female African American Governor in history. In 2020 and 2022, the African American turn-out in Georgia was record-breaking! So much so, that our impact on the outcome of the national election is still being talked about. While I understand the frustration of a perceived economic slow down on the heels of a pandemic, please realize that electing to sit this one out cannot be an option. I cannot tell you who to vote for but I can suggest that you vote your conscience and consider the impact of your vote on your community at large.

Stay focused, keep the faith and don't let anyone silence your voice. Your vote is your voice!

American Heart Month

This campaign reminds people to focus on their hearts and aims to get local communities and organizations involved in raising awareness to prevent heart disease.

The National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute (NHLBI)Trusted Source run a program called The Heart Truth, which posts fact sheets and ideas. Campaigns to raise awareness have included wearing red on the first Friday of February.

National Cancer Prevention Month

The American Institute for Cancer Research spearhead National Cancer Prevention Month, which is represented by a purple ribbon. The campaign focuses on what people can do to decrease their risk of cancer by making lifestyle changes.

Other key organizations include the American Cancer Society (ACS) and the National Foundation for Cancer Research. These organizations raise awareness through walks and runs, volunteering drives, and extensive social media campaigns.

How to get involved: The ACS accept donations all year round.

National Age-Related Macular Degeneration (AMD)/Low Vision Awareness Month

These campaigns raise awareness and education around AMD. The NEITrusted Source have various resources and advice, including videos, webinars, fact sheets, and more.

International Prenatal Infection Prevention Month

The CDC observes this campaign, and the goal is to raise awareness around prenatal infections. The Group B Strep International organization are heavily involved every February and offer a wealth of resources.

We Honor You, Reverend Lee!

Although the Reverend Jarena Lee was ordained by the AME Church posthumously during a recent general conference, in the 1800s, she was unable to attain a license to preach. As a woman seeking ordination, she was considered an outsider. Women were simply not allowed to preach, and despite her many efforts to convince Bishop Allen, she ultimately found it necessary to pursue her ministry without a license. Still, Lee was fervent in her belief that God had called her to the Gospel, and began her lonely but fruitful journey throughout Philadelphia, New York and other locations in the Northeast to preach the word of God.

Women in Ministry today stand on Lee's shoulders, whose courage and determination led to our entering the pulpit not only as preachers, but also as bishops in the AME Church. The Reverend Lee is an example of what true faith and a persistent spirit can accomplish. Today, the AME Church and our Women in Ministry honor the Reverend Jarena Lee and pay special tribute to her in February during her birthday.

Equity Not Reparations (Part 3) By Keith Burnett

Who is Accountable and what does that look like? This great travesty called the North Atlantic Slave Trade was a complex web that was facilitated by many hands. Capitalism and getting rid of one's enemy. This was not just a European endeavor, there was a wide swath of other races that capitalized off of the slave trade.

It was a business, and the fact that the brothers and sisters who worked for free for 400 years demanded their share of equity. We are quite aware of the role that the Europeans played in the North Atlantic Slave trade. Let's smash the myth that it was only facilitated by the Europeans because the catalyst was Africans. Their biggest client was the Kingdom Britain.

The top ten main African nations involved in the Slave trade were:

- Dahomey The Kingdom of Dahomey was a West African Kingdom located in present day Benin. They were a major source of slaves for the Atlantic Slave trade, raiding nearby settlements for slaves.
 - "The slave trade is the ruling principle of my people. It is the source and the glory of their wealth... the mother lulls the child to sleep with notes of triumph over an enemy reduced to slavery..." King Gezo
- Morocco The Alawite Dynasty was a Kingdom in Morocco which took part in the Trans-Saharan slave trade. The Alawite Dynasty captured many Africans and sold them as slaves to the Middle Eastern Empires. They also raided many African towns and were the center for the Arab slave trade. Slave trade finally ended 1950.
- Ottoman Algeria The Regency of Algiers was a state in Algeria that lasted from 1518 to 1830, and it was part of the Ottoman Empire. They were huge players in the slave trade. They enslaved Africans and Europeans that they raided along with the Barbary pirates.
- 4. Egypt Egypt was a major player in the Trans-Saharan and then the Atlantic slave trade. It started in 641 A.D. with the Muslim Conquest of Egypt by the Rashidun caliphate. It is estimated that millions of slaves were taken from Egypt to Asia. It ended in the 1900's after immense pressure by the British after Egypt defaulted on its debts.
- 5. Kanem Bornu The Kanem Bornu Empire was based in parts of current day Cameroon, Chad and Nigeria. It lasted from 700 to 1900 AD. The principal trade commodity of the Empire was in slaves. Initially, they were sold in the trans-Saharan slave trade and eventually participated in the transatlantic slave trade as well, with about two million slaves having moved through the slave route in their Empire.

- 6. Kingdom of Allada The Kingdom of Allada was a coastal Kingdom located in Southern Benin. It reached the peak of its power in the 16th century when it was a center of the Atlantic Slave trade, being a huge source of slaves. Slaves were captured by raiding and attacking enemy kingdoms. These slaves were then traded on to the European slavers who were bound for America.
- Aro Confederacy The Aro Confederacy was a political union located in present-day South-Eastern Nigeria. The Igbo who were part of the Aro Confederacy were one of the leading exporters of slaves.
- 8. Ashanti Empire The Ashanti Empire was an Empire based in current day Ghana. They were formed in 1700 and took part in the slave trade until the 19th century [8]. The economy of the Ashanti Empire was based on the trade of gold and slaves, while their army mainly served as a tool to capture more and more Africans and force them into slavery. Captives in war were taken as slaves to be either treated as slaves in the Empire or be exported across the Atlantic Ocean to the Americas. o Europe and the Americas from 1690 to 1902.
- 9. Songhai Empire The Songhai Empire was one of the largest states in African history and was located in Western Africa. The slave trade was a huge part of the Songhai Empire [9]. Slaves were used extensively within the Empire itself to transport goods, while literate slaves stood a chance of becoming government officials, but many were also exported in the transatlantic slave trade via European slavers.
- 10. Mali Empire The Mali Empire was based in current day Mali from 1235 to 1670 A.D. They were hugely involved in trade but also the trade of slaves through the trans-Saharan trade route. Slave labor was common and so was the export of slaves.

The reasons I mention these are in an effort to give an unbiased opinion of this great affront to our culture. Whatever African roots we enjoyed before our ancestors were kidnapped and sold as property to the highest bidder have been watered down and have basically tried to be erased from history. Let's be very clear, all parties involved were capitalists among other things.



Presidential Preference Primary (PPP) AND Special Election - County/Municipal Contests

Registration deadline – February 12th @ 5:00 p.m. EST

Early Voting – February 19th – March 8th

Mandatory Saturday Voting - February 24th and March 2nd

Absentee Ballot Request – Now through Friday, March 1st

Absentee Ballot Return deadline – Tuesday, March 12th @ 7:00 p.m. EST

Primary In-person Voting – Tuesday, March 12th

Runoffs

Early Voting for Special Election Runoff for Local Offices (if needed) - begins As soon as possible, but no later than April 1 – April 5

Special Election Runoff Absentee Ballot Request Deadline – Friday, March 29th

In-person Special Election Runoff for Local Offices (if needed) - Tuesday, April 9th.

Voter Tips/Reminders

Be sure your state issued ID matches your voter registration name.

Acceptable forms of identification if you do not have a Georgia Driver's License or State Identification Card Number

Identification with your photograph:

- United States Passport
- Georgia voter identification card
- · Other valid identification card issued by a branch, department, agency, or
- entity of the State of Georgia, any other state, or the United States
- · authorized by law to issue personal identification.
- United States military identification card
- Employee identification card issued by any branch, department, agency, or
- entity of the United States government, Georgia state government, or
- Georgia county, municipality, board, authority, or any other entity of the
- state of Georgia
- Tribal identification card

Documents that show your name and address:

Current utility bill ~ Bank statement ~ Paycheck Government check ~ Other government document

- 3. Take advantage of Early Voting and Absentee Ballots
- If your right to vote is challenged, you have a right to request a "Provisional" ballot.
