





Rev. Dr. Byron Williams Jr.

Dr. Byron Williams was appointed Head of Middle School at St. Francis Episcopal School on June 1, 2022.

Dr. Williams brings more than 20 years of ministry, teaching, and leadership experience at independent and public schools and local churches. He spent 11 years at The Kinkaid School, where he served as eighth grade dean, middle school history teacher, and admissions pod leader. Previously, he was with Burbank Middle School where he chaired the social studies department and taught middle school history.

A creative and collaborative leader, Dr. Williams offers a wealth of knowledge in curriculum alignment, new teacher mentorship, professional development, and technology integration. He loves helping students and adults reach their full potential and believes that he has a lot to learn from them.

"When students perform on stage, succeed in the classroom, or get their hearts broken, they feel real happiness, gratitude, and pain. They're not preparing for real life, they're living it," he says.

Dr. Williams holds a Bachelor of Arts degree in history from Xavier University of Louisiana and a Master of Divinity from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary. A lifelong learner, he earned his doctorate in education with a focus on curriculum and instruction from Texas A&M University. He received The Kinkaid School's Columbiana Award for Excellence in Teaching in 2016 and was named Burbank Middle School Teacher of the Year in 2008.

Whether the audience has thousands of students, hundreds of parishioners, a handful of Bible Study attendees, or a couple of professors, Dr. Williams ministers with passion, creativity, and compassion.

Rev. Dr. Byron Williams Jr. is married to the beautiful Mrs. Christy Williams and is blessed with two daughters, Gabrielle and Olivia.





– REMEMBERING – Concordia college Alabama

Selma, Alabama: The rapid expansion of the Alabama mission fields and the lack of teachers available for the 30 schools and 35 congregations started in Alabama under the leadership of Dr. Rosa J. Young and Rev. Nils J. Bakke, and the growing number of schools and congregations nationwide, prompted and necessitated the founding of this institution of higher education. Professor Rev. O.R. Lynn opened the school with 10 Lutheran female students on November 13, 1922. The first class consisted of Evie Dale, Mary Bodley, Carrie Gullett, Emma Dukes, Julie Jenkins, Grace Smith, Gertrude McBryde, Fannie Ramsey, Carrie Stallworth and Irma Dulaney, with Prof. Otho R. Lynn as president and Mrs. Nettie Moore as teacher and Rosa J. Young as matron. The first four graduates (on June 1, 1926) were Gertrude McBryde, Carrie G. Stallworth, Lela M. Young and Grace H. Smith. Under President Lynn's leadership, the Academy-College grew to support the mission work and schools of LCMS Black ministry throughout Alabama, Florida, Louisiana and Mississippi, ultimately serving black Lutheran congregations throughout the nation.

As the mission field of witnessing to African Americans grew for the LCMS and the need for missionary church workers expanded across the nation, Alabama Luther Academy and College became Concordia College Alabama, under its longest-tenured president and leader, Rev. Dr. Julius Jenkins. Of the presidents and leaders of Alabama Luther Academy and College, none was as prolific in serving the academy and college as Rev. Dr. Julius Jenkins. Under Jenkins' leadership, the college grew in students, facilities, curriculums, athletics, student financial support and community collaborations. Jenkins retired July 31, 2007. In 2018, the college closed its doors for good because of finances, an unfortunate move especially because of the great need of Gospel proclamation among growing ethnically diverse groups of Americans.

A Memorial HONOR for Rev. Dr. William H. Griffin Jr.'s Faithful Years of Service.

Rev. Dr. Williams H. Griffin Jr. born in 1929 in Kannapolis, North Carolina. In 1951, William Griffin was the sole student in his graduating class at Immanuel Seminary. Rev. Griffin's first ministry was in Wilcox County, Alabama. He served at Holy Cross, Camden; Our Savior, Possum Bend; and Redeemer, Long Mile. Griffin preached at three churches every Sunday and, with Rev. Richard Dickerson, also recorded sermons for a radio station in Monroeville. Rev. Dr. William Griffin Jr. served as pastor of Trinity Lutheran Church, Selma, Alabama, in 1952, where Rosa Young was also a member and godmother to Griffin's son. In 1954, Rev. Griffin accepted a mission call to Grace Lutheran Church in Mongomery, Ala., just two blocks from the church of Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. (Dexter Avenue Baptist Church). The Griffins hired Rosa Parks for drapery work in their new home in Montgomery. In 1954, Griffin received a call from Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King to participate in the infamous bus boycott. Griffin assisted by using his 1954 Chevy to help with transportation during the boycott.

In 1968, after the assignation of Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., Dr. Griffin and other BLACK Lutheran pastors met and decided to form the Black Clergy Caucus. Dr. Griffin taught at Concordia University in River Forest, Illinois, and at Concordia St. Louis. He earned his Master's of Divinity in 1951 from Immanuel Lutheran College, and in1968 a Master's Degree in Education from Concordia University, and was awarded an honorary doctorate from Concordia Seminary. Griffin was also a Director of the Deaconette Program at Concordia University, River Forest. Rev. Dr. Williams Griffin also served at two Chicago churches before retiring in 1983. Griffin also served as a Wheat Ridge Ministries representative and vacancy pastor of Zion Lutheran Church in Chicago.

Rev. Dr. William H. Griffin Sr. inherited the work ethic "Ora et Labora" (pray and work) from his parents, Willie and Bessie.

Rev. Dr. William H Griffin Jr. retired a second time in 2009 to render full-time care to his wife, Ella Mae, who was called to glory in 2015. Griffin's two sons, Marvin and Mark(deceased) followed their fathers' footsteps and became Lutheran pastors. Griffin also has a Lutheran pastor son-in-law, Rev. Collins Parham, husband to Griffins' daughter Marie. The Griffins were also blessed with one other daughter, Millicent.

Rev. Dr. James Wiggins Sr. is a native of Camden, Wilcox County, Alabama. The son of the late Mr. and Mrs. George Wiggins Sr.

Reverend Wiggins received his elementary education in the Lutheran School System of Wilcox County, Alabama. He attained his high school diploma from Alabama Lutheran Academy and College (Concordia College) in Selma, Alabama (1951). He received a bachelor's degree from Immanuel Lutheran College in Greensboro, North Carolina (1955).

In 1959, Rev. Wiggins graduated from Immanuel Lutheran Theological Seminary, Greensboro, North Carolina and took further extension courses from Concordia Theological Seminary in Springfield, Illinois. He also took graduate courses in the area of sociology at Miles College in Birmingham, Alabama.

He served in the church on the district level in the following areas: Circuit Counselor, Mission Committee, Circuit Youth Advisor, Commission on Adjudication, Treasurer of the District Black Churchmen Conference and is presently serving as the Chairman of the Rosebud Memorial Project.

Congregations served: St. James Lutheran, Buena Vista, Alabama, Mt. Olive Lutheran, Hybert, Alabama and St. Andrews Lutheran, Sedan, Alabama. Those three congregations merged into Immanuel Lutheran in Vredenburgh, Alabama in 1969. He served as the vacancy pastor of St. Paul Lutheran, Oak Hill, Alabama, 1965-1976, Zion Lutheran in Bessemer, Alabama 1976-1983, and Trinity Lutheran in Montgomery, Alabama, 1984 - 1997. He retired in 1995 and relocated to Pensacola, Florida where he remains a faithful member of St. Matthews Lutheran Church.

"When hearing of his honorary doctorate, it was," God is still gracious, even at 91."

Rev. Dr. James Wiggins Sr. is married to the late Mrs. Katie Ghaskin Wiggins and was blessed with four children-late Rev. James Wiggins Jr, Rev. Stephen Wiggins Sr., Felicia Thornton, and Karen Wiggins. He has nine grandchildren and five great grandchildren.

A HISTORICAL SEED OF 150 YEARS OF BLACK MINISTRY



LUTHERAN COLLEGE

Immanuel Lutheran College was founded at Concord, NC in 1903 by the Evangelical Synodical Lutheran Conference, moving to Greensboro in 1905. Operated by Germans, the school was created to meet "increased demand for God-fearing negro teachers and ministers." The school believed that "mental training without the Word of God to be of small value."

Era of Progress and Promise notes that in addition to a strong liberal arts course of study emphasizing English, German, Latin and Greek, Immanuel put a strong emphasis on music education and performance. Vocal music was obligatory, and students were required to sight read music. They were encouraged to master both the cabinet and reed organs. Not surprisingly, Immanuel offered music and dramatics as activities for students.

The *Greensboro Record* article noted that the college had four divisions—the academic division was a four-year high school; the theological division led to a Bachelor of Divinity degree. There was a regular junior college, and a one-year normal school.

At the time of closure, Immanuel Luther College averaged 110-115 students – 50% of whom were from outside of North Carolina. The final graduating classes numbered nine from college and 13 from the high school. Following the Brown vs. Board of Education Supreme Court decision, enrollment fell to the point that the synod determined the school did not have a valid function. It closed in 1961.

Bricks and Mortar. The Main Building of Immanuel Lutheran College was begun in 1905. It was on the north side of East Market Street in Greensboro at the intersection with Luther, in a thirteen-acre campus. By 1940, the campus contained four large granite buildings, two dormitories and a seminary building in addition to the main building. Apparently, the main building was modified. Early photos show a building with towers and turrets resembling a French Chateau. 1940 photos show the same building—now also serving as a men's dormitory—with the towers and turrets removed.

After the college closed, the campus became a part of North Carolina A&M College. The main building was razed. One of the last buildings—a dormitory gymnasium, was used by A&T until 2005 when it, too, was razed. A state monument marks the location of the former college.

School advertisements emphasize the importance of sports for personal development at the intramural level. However, a 1938 ad notes that "the faculty are enthusiastic for athletics and coach the students especially in basketball and baseball." Immanuel Lutheran fielded intercollegiate teams in basketball for both men and women from the 1930's until the close of the college.

Byron Williams Sr., St Paul Lutheran Church and First Lady of St. Paul, Joycelyn Williams, performed exceptionally in preparing of this 2025 Black Family Convocation.
