Will Christ Return on May 21, 2011?

Christians need to focus on three questions: 1.) Does the Bible give a specific date on which Christ will return? 2.) Could Christ return for His church on May 21, 2011? 3.) If the Lord were to return on May 21, 2011 would that validate the false teachings of Harold Camping?

A False Prophet Who Has Learned Nothing

Certified false prophet Harold Camping says that the Lord Jesus Christ will return one year from tomorrow — May 21, 2011 — and that the world will end five months after that. Camping has obviously learned nothing from his past failed predictions. In a feature article in the January 1, 2010 *San Francisco Chronicle*,¹ the audacity of this certified false prophet is nothing short of astounding —

Harold Camping lets out a hearty chuckle when he considers the people who believe the world will end in 2012.

"That date has not one stitch of biblical authority," Camping says from the Oakland office where he runs Family Radio, an evangelical station that reaches listeners around the world. "It's like a fairy tale."

The real date for the end of times, he says, is in 2011.

The Mayans and the recent Hollywood movie "2012" have put the apocalypse in the popular mind this year, but Camping has been at this business for a long time. And while Armageddon is pop science or big-screen entertainment to many, Camping has followers from the Bay Area to China.

Camping, 88, has scrutinized the Bible for almost 70 years and says he has developed a mathematical system to interpret prophecies hidden within the Good Book. One night a few years ago, Camping, a civil engineer by trade, crunched the numbers and was stunned at what he'd found: The world will end May 21, 2011.

The Family Radio Cult & Financial Empire

In 2005 Camping published his prediction as a book, *Time Has an End: A Biblical History of the World 11,013 B.C. — 2011 A.D.* (Vantage Press). But as the *Chronicle* reminds us, "This is not the first time Camping has made a bold prediction about Judgment Day" —

On Sept. 6, 1994, dozens of Camping's believers gathered inside Alameda's Veterans Memorial Building to await the return of Christ, an event Camping had promised for two years. Followers dressed children in their Sunday best and held Bibles open-faced toward heaven.

But the world did not end. Camping allowed that he may have made a mathematical error. He spent the next decade running new calculations, as well as overseeing a media company [Family Stations, Inc. aka Family Radio] that has grown significantly in size and reach.²

Family Radio is a huge enterprise. According to published financial records Camping's cult has net assets of over \$120 million. The market value of the licenses for its 109 radio stations and two television stations is estimated to be nearly \$1 billion.

The Audacity of Numerology

Harold Camping believes he has discovered what no one else ever knew, and what Scripture says is un-knowable by man: the day of Christ's return. He further says that

God's wrath upon the left-behind unsaved will last just five months. The world will end on October 21, 2011, and those five months will be the entirety of the punishment of the unsaved who are left on earth. At that time the wicked will not be cast into Hell, he says (contrary to the plain teaching of Psalm 9:17 and Revelation 20:15), but will simply cease to exist.

Camping's theology has taken ever more bizarre twists and turns over the past few years as he has received, as he claims, a succession of new revelations from God (contrary to Revelation 22:18-19). It is telling that the farther Harold Camping sinks into the abyss of cultish apostasy, the more his teachings resemble those of the Watchtower Society (Jehovah's Witnesses).

Camping's so-called seventy-year study of the Bible has consisted mainly of his development of a numerological system through which all Scripture, he says, must be interpreted. The *Chronicle* article continues:

The number 5, Camping concluded, equals "atonement." Ten is "completeness." Seventeen means "heaven." Camping patiently explained how he reached his conclusion for May 21, 2011.

"Christ hung on the cross April 1, 33 A.D.," he began. "Now go to April 1 of 2011 A.D., and that's 1,978 years."

Camping then multiplied 1,978 by 365.2422 days — the number of days in each solar year, not to be confused with a calendar year.

Next, Camping noted that April 1 to May 21 encompasses 51 days. Add 51 to the sum of previous multiplication total, and it equals 722,500.

Camping realized that $(5 \times 10 \times 17) \times (5 \times 10 \times 17) = 722,500$.

Or put into words: (Atonement x Completeness x Heaven), squared.

"Five times 10 times 17 is telling you a story," Camping said. "It's the story from the time Christ made payment for your sins until you're completely saved.

"I tell ya, I just about fell off my chair when I realized that," Camping said.

We almost fall off our chair as we witness this false prophet's brazen disregard for God's Word — the audacity of numerology.

The Leader Can't Be Wrong

The article cites a critic who says (with tremendous understatement) that "Camping makes a classic beginner's mistake when he sets a date for Christ's return. Jesus himself said in Matthew 24:36, 'Of that day and hour knows no man, no, not the angels of heaven, but My Father only.' " But, the *Chronicle* notes, Camping's cult followers "will have none of it."

Rick LaCasse, who attended the September 1994 service in Alameda [where Camping was proven a false prophet], said that 15 years later, his faith in Camping has only strengthened.

"Evidently, he was wrong," LaCasse allowed, "but this time it is going to happen. There was some doubt last time, but we didn't have any proofs. This time we do."

Would his opinion of Camping change if May 21, 2011, ended without incident?

"I can't even think like that," LaCasse said. "Everything is too positive right now. There's too little time to think like that."

It is classic cult-follower thinking to say that the human leader can't possibly be wrong. "Folly is joy to him who is destitute of discernment" (Proverbs 15:21). Let every true Christian heed the inspired words of the Apostle Paul:

And this I pray, that your love may abound still more and more in knowledge and all discernment, that you may approve the things that are excellent, that you may be sincere and without offense till the day of Christ, being filled with the fruits of righteousness which are by Jesus Christ, to the glory and praise of God (Philippians 1:9-11).

Three Critical Questions

Will the Lord Jesus Christ return for His church on May 21, 2011? Christians need to focus on three questions:

1. Does the Bible give a specific date on which Christ will return? Absolutely not. (Matthew 24:36, Acts 1:7, 1 Thessalonians 5:2, 2 Peter 3:10, Zechariah 14:7)
2. Could the Lord Jesus Christ return for His church on May 21, 2011? Absolutely yes! He could return at any time. (1 Corinthians 15:50-58)
3. If the Lord were to return on May 21, 2011 would that validate the false teachings of Harold Camping about sin and salvation, the deity of Christ, the inspiration and authority of the Bible, and so much more? Absolutely not! (Deuteronomy 4:2 and 12:32, Proverbs 30:6, Revelation 22:18-19)

"For false Christs and false prophets will rise and show great signs and wonders to deceive, if it were possible, even the elect" (Matthew 24:24). Don't be deceived!
