Authority of the Gospel (1:1-5, 10)

- Paul understands who he is through the lens of the Gospel.
- The Gospel produces a legacy to which believers may belong.
- The Gospel liberates believers to be in community on freedom's terms.
- God is glorified as the Gospel is lived out.
- The Gospel liberates individuals to pursue God's will for their lives.

Exclusivity of the Gospel (1:6-9)

- The Gospel of Jesus Christ points to God's grace.
- A "different Gospel" does not come from God.
- There is only one Gospel message.
- Perverting the Gospel:
 - ➢ Diminishes the sufficiency of Calvary (see 1:4)
 - \succ Reinforces bondage to the evil age (see 1:4)
 - \succ Is grounds for removal from the community of faith.



In what ways can the exclusivity of the Gospel be seen (or not seen) in the Church today?

Called to the Gospel (1:11-24)

- Liberation is an inherently Divine characteristic.
- Transformation begins where you are with an eye toward where God has purposed you to be.
- Consecration demonstrates God's providence and purpose.
- Revelation comes from God to affirm God's plan.
- Confirmation begins with God and includes other people.
- Salvation affords an opportunity for a new story.
