

Live, Laugh, and Love!

"Change is the only constant in life."

- Heraclites, Greek philosopher, 5th century B.C.

"As long as the earth endures, seedtime and harvest, cold and heat, summer and winter, day and night will never cease."

- Moses, quoting God speaking to Noah (Genesis 8:22)

Of all the seasons within a single year, autumn is perhaps best known as the season of change. We watch with anticipation as the leaves turn from green to shades of gold, orange, and red. We then watch with some sadness as those same leaves fall to the ground and landscapes begin to take on the familiar barren look of the approaching winter. In reality, the natural world is changing continuously in every season: awakening, growing, producing, shedding, dying, decaying, resting, enriching, freezing, thawing, warming, and awakening once again. The cycle continues, but it does not simply repeat itself. It changes. It moves forward. The tree that went through the cycle last year is bigger this year. Another tree dies. And as individual trees change, so does the forest.

Here's another example. We know that our experience of night and day is based upon the rotation of the earth in relation to the sun. The earth spins on its axis, completing one complete rotation every 24 hours. However, that is not the only movement of the earth. While the earth spins, it also revolves around the sun, making the entire trip every 365 and ¼ days. And at the same time, our solar system is hurling through the Milky Way galaxy, which, in turn, is hurling through the universe.

What is my point? Even while we experience life day by day by day, the days do not simply repeat. Life moves in a direction, and that movement brings change. No wonder Heraclitus claimed that "No man ever steps in the same river twice, for it's not the same river and he's not the same man."

As a church, we meet and do much the same thing every Sunday, every week, every year—year after year. Yet, we don't stay the same. We change. We are born. We live. We grow. We die. People come. People go. We impact each other. But through it all, God is faithful. As Jeremiah wrote in Lamentations 3:22-23,

The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases, for his mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning; great is your faithfulness.

Have you ever been in a season of life where no matter what good you do, it feels like you can't prevail? Some days are much harder than others. I call these hard times my Job moments.

Job is a man in the bible who was blameless and upright. He feared God and shunned the devil. He was a man of character and integrity, and someone we all should learn from. While talking with Satan about Job, God agreed to allow Job's faith to be tested. This sounded audacious until I realized that God loved, knew, and trusted Job so much that He knew Job would not only stand firm in his faith, but that God's glory would be shown in the place of desolation in Jobs life.

Gods hand was on him so those things can be taking away and then replaced and all that God is focused on is simply a relationship with you.

The Bible story goes on to say that Jobs character, health, and property were threatened. Job lost his wealth, his children, and his friends. His situation seems so dark that his own wife tells him to curse God and die, because even she can't see or understand how God is moving or how His ways and thoughts are not ours. His is higher!

My prayer is that we as the body of Christ are able to trust in God's promise to prosper us even in the dark moments when our future seems uncertain; because just like Job, we are reminded that God is the beginning and the end. Atlantic Northeast District Conference 2023

Questions, questions, questions... they were the tool to prompt discussion at District Conference this year. Each person who gave a report, ended it by asking two questions. The delegates were given eight minutes to discuss the questions and record the answers. Here are some of the questions that have stayed with me since the conference.

What if your church closed? Would the community notice? This question was posed by Pastor Ryan Braught from Veritas, a church plant in Lancaster, during an insight session after lunch.

He was encouraging us to get church out of our buildings and do more work in our neighborhoods. The cultural divide is so large right now between older people who want to go into a church building and worship, and younger generations who are not interested in institutions. We need to go out and meet people where they are.

How can camp bring people together in the future? asked Camp Swatara director Tim Courtright. This question highlighted the goal of the district to remind us that we are not alone in our work. There are about 70 other congregations in the district, many right in this area. The district provides activities to help us connect with each other.

Some ways to connect are by working on projects together using Church 2 Church, worshiping at one of the other Brethren



churches occasionally, going to a Youth or Women's Fellowship district activity, or planning a retreat together at camp!



Leonor Ochoa did not ask questions in her opening meditation at the beginning of the business day, but it was still very thought provoking. She focused on the theme of conference, "The Tie that Binds." The illustration of this theme shows that we are sewn, or woven, together with Jesus and put down

roots with Him. Together our roots can be deep, strong, and robust. She also encouraged churches to go out into the world. We should strive to bless, forgive, and share grace with people around us.

One final question that struck me was posed by Mark Cunningham, Executive Director of COBYS Family Services. After showing pictures of the children and families their agency has helped this year, he asked.

"What drives you? What are you doing about it?" ... something for us all to think about.

Sound System Upgrades

Praise ye the Lord, sing unto the Lord a new song and his praise in the congregation of saints.

(Psalm 149:1)

At the Fall Congregational Forum this year, the Worship Team reported on new upgrades coming soon to the sound system in the sanctuary. This is the culmination of months of planning that began shortly after the last Spring Congregational Forum, when the Worship Team reported that there was technical assistance and grants from the ANE District to assist churches in need of improvements to their streaming. At Indian Creek, there has been ongoing concerns over the quality of sound over the livestream, especially by musicians. Because the livestream is not just for our congregation, but for Peter Becker Community, potential visitors, and can be seen publically by anyone, it is important to improve this aspect.

In May, the Worship Team set up an ad hoc committee for the purpose of assessing our sound needs, vetting sound technicians, and ultimately making a recommendation for Leadership Team's approval. The ad hoc committee consisted of Pastor Mark Baliles, Brian Detweiler, Natasha Edwards, and Chris McBreen, with valuable impute from Noah Baliles, Dennis Duett, and the rest of the Worship Team.

Over the summer months, the team contacted multiple sound technicians and met with 4 who did free onsite assessments and provided multiple proposals, ranging from around \$11,000 to \$40,000. We had two really strong options and ultimately awarded the contract to Fitch Electronics in Pottstown, due to the superior equipment proposed, their interpersonal skills and flexibility to provide additional training and support, and the opportunity for us to create a longstanding relationship with a local small business.

We also applied for the grant and were awarded \$7,500 toward the project (\$2,500 over the normal award due to our congregation's strong involvement with and support of the District and our own Dennis Duett being part of the District's technical assistance team). Praise the Lord!

The upgrades will include:

- 1. New digital sound board with ability to control from a phone or iPad.
- 2. Two new standing choir mics and tuning of current overhead choir mics.
- 3. Two new audience mics to pick up congregational participation.
- 4. Two new wireless mics: 1 handheld and 1 headset.
- 5. Rehanging the existing house speaker for safety.

Other needs that were highly recommended but tabled due to cost were new house speakers for the sanctuary and new monitors. The team is hoping to add new monitors soon.

The final quote was \$11,671. After use of grant funds, the remaining balance is \$4,171.

To cover the cost, the balance will be split between the Vision Fund and donations.

We are prayerfully hoping to have everything installed by the Thanksgiving service. Thank you to the team for their hard work, and thank you for your support!
