

Advent Reflections on John 1:1-14

As we enter this Advent season, I invite you to join me in taking time to reflect anew on the miracle and meaning of Jesus' coming into this world. This passage from John 1 is a great place to start.

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was with God in the beginning. Through him all things were made; without him nothing was made that has been made. In him was life, and that life was the light of all mankind. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it...

He was in the world, and though the world was made through him, the world did not recognize him. He came to that which was his own, but his own did not receive him. Yet to all who did receive him, to those who believed in his name, he gave the right to become children of God—children born not of natural descent, nor of human decision or a husband's will, but born of God.

The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us. We have seen his glory, the glory of the one and only Son, who came from the Father, full of grace and truth.

I especially love the wording of verse 14 as paraphrased in The Message.

The Word became flesh and blood, and moved into the neighborhood. We saw the glory with our own eyes, the one-of-a-kind glory, like Father, like Son, generous inside and out, true from start to finish.

Here are some questions I invite you to ponder with me this year. What does it mean for us that God in Christ came near to us, that he entered our world, and that he moved into our neighborhood? What does it mean to us that seeing Jesus helps us see and know the Father? How have our lives been changed by the grace and truth that are in Jesus?

Then ponder with me this question. How is God calling us to be like Jesus to our world—to move into other neighborhoods, to show what God is like, to be "generous inside and out, true from start to finish"?

Our November activity was the second annual Brethren Baking Contest. This is one of our favorite events! The first event was the Technical Challenge. Each youth had to bake 2 identical individual apple pies using a recipe that stated things like "add water until thicker than pudding" and "bake until done". Although this was the wording from an actual recipe, the directions are purposely vague to challenge the baking knowledge and skills of the contestants.



Bakers Jadon Bateman, Joseph Grau, Claire Spigel and Nathan Stevens each tried slightly different variations. Jadon added sauce to the bottom of the pie as well as the top. Joseph opted for large apple slices while Claire cubed her apples. Nathan went with the adage that you can never have too much cinnamon sugar. After the pies were baked, the 3 guest judges had a difficult time deciding a winner.





This is a blind challenge, so the judges didn't know whose pies were whose. Pam Bateman liked the pie that tasted more "appley", while Helen Spigel preferred the one that tasted like a traditional pie. Marge Landis has a real sweet tooth and

liked the ones with the most sugar. In the end, Nathan was victorious in the technical challenge.

The second event is the Show Stopper. Here the bakers get to showcase their creativity. They each baked a fruit pizza and were given an array of fruit to decorate it with. Some chose designs that were geographic, some chose more random arrangements. Some thinly sliced their fruit while others put big old chunks of fruit on theirs. Some judges were partial to the fancy designs while others were heard to say "I want bigger strawberries." It was a really tough decision and the judges deliberated and re-tasted many times. Finally. Nathan was crowned the overall winner because of his Show Stopper presentation and description, and the fact that he came in first in the Technical Challenge. Nathan was given the coveted trophy (a paper plate with "winner" written on it). We all had a great time! Special thanks to our judges for spending the afternoon with us.
