

Pastoral Transition

Pastor Mark has accepted the call to serve another congregation. He and his family will be greatly missed! Please join us for worship and the farewell luncheon on February18 after church.

So now it is time for we here at the Indian Creek to seek a new pastor. Since our congregation is part of the larger Church of the Brethren, we will receive assistance in this process. The first step is for our Atlantic Northeast District Executive, Pete Kontra, to propose an interim pastor to help with pastoral duties while we search for a new permanent pastor. The Leadership Team is responsible for interviewing and hiring the interim pastor. This process is currently underway. Pete has a couple of candidates in mind and is working to make a presentation to the Leadership Team. There may be a period of time between Pastor Mark leaving and an interim pastor starting here. Our Witness and Worship Team is working to call people to fill the pulpit during this time, just as they do whenever Pastor Mark is away. If anyone has suggestions for pulpit supply, please talk to Sue Moyer or Kevin Bedell.

The Leadership Team is also working to put together a Search Committee. This committee will, with Pete's guidance, develop a congregational profile which will be used by district executives and prospective pastoral candidates to determine who may be the best fit as pastor for our congregation.

The Congregational Profile will:

-Gather demographic congregational information -Determine pastoral financial support parameters -Articulate congregational hopes, dreams, and vision for the congregation and new pastor

The Search Committee will interview prospective pastoral candidates and negotiate on behalf of our congregation. Once the committee has agreed upon one candidate who then accepts the invitation to move forward in the process, the next step will be the committee presenting the candidate to the full congregation for familiarization and a vote to call the candidate as our next pastor.

We are very close to naming our Search Committee. Once named, the committee will begin the process by receiving orientation from Pete. The process of finding a new pastor is not necessarily a quick one. It is not unusual for the process to take 12-18 months. For some congregations it is taking years.

Please look here in future Ripples issues for updates as we walk this journey of transition together.

DEACON SPOTLIGHT

And you shall remember all the way in which the Lord your God has led you these forty years in the wilderness, that he might humble you, testing you to know what was in your heart, whether you would keep his commandment or not."

-Deuteronomy 8:2

The old Presbyterian lectionary calls for a reading from the Old Testament from the eighth chapter of Deuteronomy on New Year's Day. It is Moses speaking. He stands on a low ridge facing the peoples of Israel who are about to end their forty years of seemingly aimless wandering in the desert and enter the Promised Land. They can see that land stretched out before them as some endless panorama of possibility behind Moses. Moses while speaking, gazes over their heads back toward the wilderness and tells them that what happened there was not aimless nor without purpose. The people were to remember "all the way" of the wilderness, the whole trip.

As the new year comes upon us, we probably have a great desire to put the old behind us and "Call it to mind no more." Maybe the past year felt like so much aimless wandering in the wilderness; or maybe the past year seemed like forty years to us. If we are still licking our wounds or bemoaning unfinished bussiness, we will want to say "be done with it" and push on. But you know what they say about people who refuse to remember the past – they end up repeating it.

Last year is a part of our wilderness wanderings and we too should remember "all the way." That journey of the spirit involves not only great testing in life's desert places, but in times of blessing that we had never known before. We gained wisdom about God's dealings with us and have found him to be our bridge over troubled waters. A pagan might say we lucked out despite a fickle fate. As Christians, though, we know God gave us a strong, dry ship of faith to ride out the storm. And it is only in the storm that the ship's strength is shown and our courage proven. There is no reason to be brave when life is calm.

The wilderness of the past year should be remembered because it showed us more of what was in our hearts that should not be forgotten. It showed God's great care of us in times of need with blessings unheard of before. It becomes recollection of precious and sacred memories which strengthen our faith and hope for the future. As we travel into the future, let us recall the God given moments when we were proud and forgetful and he humbled us, when we were empty and he filled us.

"And he humbled you and let you hunger and fed you with manna, which you did not know, nor did your fathers know; that he might make you know that man does not live by bread alone, but that man lives by everything that comes out of the mouth of the Lord."
