Catch Up! Show Up! Join In! Lean In!

Ready or not, September is here. Although the calendar says there are a few more weeks of summer, most of our vacations are over and most children have already started back to school. One more holiday weekend, then we "gear up" to get back to work—whatever that might mean in each of our individual contexts.

There is a similar feeling in our life together as a church. Here are four suggestions for each of us to consider seriously as we transition into the next season of the year.

First, take time to **catch up**. Life at Indian Creek did not stop while you were away. In fact, there was quite a bit going on, as you can see in this issue of Ripples. Read the whole thing. And while you're at it, go on our website and read the July-August issue, too. We also kept meeting each week for Sunday school and worship. We spent most of the summer continuing our sermon series, "Seeing Jesus through Matthew's Eyes." Each of these sermons can be found on our website, as well as on our Facebook page.

Second, **show up**. That's it. Whenever possible, show up. We really do miss you when you're gone.

Third, **join in**. Deepen your experience and spiritual growth by getting involved in Bible study, in music, in fellowship, in service, or in leadership. A new Sunday school year is starting. Choir rehearsal begins Wednesday. You could help with the nursery, visit the sick or lonely, or volunteer with others at Peter Becker Community or the Mennonite Resource Center.

Fourth, **lean in**. Do what you can to contribute to *deep connection* (with each other and with God), *deep conviction* (about who God is and what is most important in following Christ), *deep compassion* (caring about other people, curious about their story), *deep confession* (owning our own failures and limitations of our own knowing and doing), *deep conversation* (sharing and listening well), and *deep contribution* (using what God has given you to serve others). All of these areas of focus will go a long way to helping us fulfill God's purpose for us: to be a church that looks and loves like Jesus—one that is "**healthy** and **growing** and **full of love**" (Eph. 4:14-16, NLT).

Our August activity was participating in a FaithX trip (formerly known as workcamp) to serve in Winston-Salem North Carolina! This was the first FaithX trip for all of our youth who attended and they all did a GREAT job! They were hard workers, eager helpers, very patient, tolerant of others, never complained, and willing to step outside of their comfort zones. The youth who participated were Jadon Bateman, Kadlin Grau, Joseph Grau, Claire Spigel, and Helen Spigel. Brian Detweiler was an advisor and Donna Parcell was director and advisor.

We served with an organization called SPARK'DWELL who serves the local community in many capacities. In our morning worship times our daily speakers were leaders in local organizations who spoke to us about topics such as food insecurity, homelessness, mental health, and addiction. We were accompanied each day by counselors, who are homeless people in the community who work with these organizations. We were incredibly impressed with their work ethic and commitment to these programs. One gentleman lives in a tent, yet always dresses in a suit. He was with us all day offering encouragement, advice, and knowledge. After that he took 3 different buses to work a part time job. Then he went back to the community center to watch over things. Finally, he returned to his tent for 3 hours of sleep. Another young woman was abandoned at age 11, and she still became the first in her family to graduate high school.

A particularly meaningful experience was our "walk through the margins" on our first day. We were divided into groups and given a common task that the community deals with. Each group was assigned one of these tasks: find temporary housing, apply for a valid id, apply for a job, seek help for mental illness, or seek help for addiction.

We experienced the frustration of waiting in long lines only to be turned away, having to take long bus rides or walk several miles, or needing the internet to apply for things. It was really an eye opening experience. Each group followed all the instructions and did everything correctly, yet each group failed. It certainly changed how we perceive homelessness. We learned that everyone has a story, and many are trying their best in a system designed to fail them.

There were many work projects. Our group was part of 4 different ones. We painted a mural of encouragement at the community



center and got to interact with a lot of amazing people. We worked with children in a day camp and had fun playing games with them and

even got to play 4 square in the rain. We painted walls and doors at a thrift store. And we worked washing dishes and packaging food at the largest food bank we have ever seen.



It was hard work, but we all were eager to pitch in and help.

At night we had worship services where we participated in communion, anointing, and foot washing. All were very meaningful.

This experience was life changing for us. We learned so much about ourselves and the world around us.

WE'RE IN THE BUSINESS OF BEING KINGDOM PEOPLE.

"Kingdom people seek first the Kingdom of God and its justice; church people often put church work above concerns of justice, mercy, and truth. Church people worry that the world might change the church; Kingdom people work to see the church change the world."

"Because justice issues related to homelessness, hunger, poverty, racism, education disparity, and more are complex situations that require complex conversations and answers, SPARK and The Dwelling team up (Spark'Dwell) to offer opportunities for young people and adults to spend a week during the summer...participating in Spirit and Service Learning Opportunities."

"Hosted (housed) at a local partner church, participants engage in a week of relationship-building, education, story-telling and service alongside formerly or currently homeless individuals. In doing so, participants will better understand the complexity of the systems and institutions perpetuating injustice and inequity, how the church is responding as Matthew 25 people, and way that they can continue to advocate for justice in their own communities."

For the past few weeks, we have been working toward getting everything clean and ready for the children when they come to play on their first day of school on September 11. We are still registering new students and enjoy showing them around when they come to visit, so they can see firsthand what they will find in the classroom when they arrive for school.

This week, we are also hosting family picnics in order to celebrate back-to-school days while making and renewing acquaintances. After



enjoying a picnic supper, the children are sure to joyfully share playground time together. We thank the Stewards for providing a fresh layer of mulch and for checking the safety of the equipment in order to provide for continued healthful outdoor play for the children.



Our theme for the month of September will take us to the moon and back, as we launch into the new school year with a unit about **SPACE.** We will
