


Words from Pastor Bryant

Dear Disciples,

I was out to eat the other day. It was the rare occasion where my kids weren't with—just me, my wife, and a couple friends. We were at a fairly busy restaurant; there was a nice, gentle din of conversation, glasses clinking, and shuffling of chairs and feet as folks went in and out.

At some point during our time there, there came this quite familiar sound. The sound of a young child complaining loudly to their parents that no, they didn't want broccoli on their mac and cheese. And then later on, the sound of silverware hitting the floor as another kid carelessly dropped it on the floor. And then even later, the sound of a child crying because they were probably too tired or simply done with having dinner and wanted to go home.

Every one of those sounds initiated part one of a two-step process within the deep recesses of my brain. I've grown so accustomed to responding to the cries of a child and the multitude of problems that arise from something difficult—like eating mac and cheese—that for a fraction of a second my brain nearly made me turn and look to see how I could help out.

But, before any decision could be made, my subconscious processed that, no, that was not the cries of help from my particular child—so, I could continue to sit and enjoy my meal. There was another parent there to deal with the particular problems of their particular child—I was free to continue on and ignore them. *Not my circus, not my mon-keys*.

Thanks be to God that Jesus doesn't operate in the same manner. Now just mere weeks from Holy Week and his own crucifixion and death, thanks be to God that Jesus doesn't look out at the world and say, "You know what? This isn't my problem anyway. I'm simply going to ignore the pleas and cries of humanity."

The good news of this upcoming Holy Week is that God isn't just a parent to some, he's a Father to all. And as Father he never ignores the cries of his children. As Father, he hasn't sent his own Son for the salvation of only particular people, but instead the whole world.

For when we cry out, God listens. And before we even knew what we needed, Jesus died for us. Because that's what a parent does for their child. And, without a doubt, you are a child of God. Beloved. Forgiven. And saved by the blood of the one who holds you close in grace and love, Jesus Christ.

EASTER FUN FACTS AND INFO



Historically, most early Easter celebrations would have served lamb, but these days many American Easter dinners feature ham because of the timing of the holiday. Years ago, hams cured over the winter months and would have been ready to serve in early spring.

Easter lilies originated in Japan and arrived in England in the 1700's. They became known in the US after World War I. The transition from dormant bulbs to delicate flowers symbolizes hope and rebirth.

Easter egg hunts have Medieval origins. A priest would give one of the choir boys a hard-boiled egg and the choir boys would pass it amongst themselves until the clock struck midnight, when whoever was holding it was allowed to eat it.

There is an old superstition that if you wore new clothes on Easter, you would have good luck the rest of the year. This tradition of showing off your new clothes became the basis of the New York Easter Parade and Easter Bonnet Festival.

The Easter egg tradition seems to come from Medieval Europe and Christians may not have been the ones to start this tradition. People around the world used to, and still do, give others eggs as a symbol of fertility and rebirth.

Some scholars believe that the word "Easter" was named after a festival celebrating the goddess Eostre and the coming of spring. Her symbols are thought to be the hare and the egg which may be where we got the Easter Bunny.

There is a theory that the early Christians in Mesopotamia dyed eggs to represent the blood of Jesus Christ.

The idea of the Easter Bunny delivering candy and eggs originated in Germany during the Middle Ages. It is first mentioned in the 1500's. Dutch settlers in Pennsylvania brought the tradition to the US in the 1700's.

The most candy sales in the US occur just before Easter and Halloween. \$2.6 billion is spent on candy alone for Easter. Americans eat about 1.5 million Peeps during Easter! The Bethlehem, Pennsylvania factory makes 5.5 million Peeps a day. Each one takes just 6 minutes to make. Americans also consume over 16 million jelly beans during Easter. That's enough jelly beans to circle the globe three times! Also, around 90 million chocolate bunnies are sold for Easter.

The White House Easter Egg Roll formally started in 1878 by President Rutherford B. Hayes, but first-hand accounts say that there were informal festivities beginning during President Abraham Lincoln's tenure. White House Easter Egg Roll tickets are free and are made available via an online lottery. Each child leaves the White House with a commemorative wooden egg.

East Union History

Curt Lundquist has lived in and about the East Union area since his birth just across Bevens Creek on Maplewood Road, the farm where Tom Lundquist currently lives. Curt's dad, Johnny, grandfather William, and great grandfather Charles all farmed and worshiped at East Union Church. His mother, Effie Olander, her father August Olander and grandfather Olaf Nilson all were early members of East Union. Effie and Edgar, (Vernis Strom's dad) were brother and sister.



When Curt was a very young boy, a tornado came through this area and knocked over the barn on his dad's farm and damaged other surrounding farms. He thinks his dad and helper were in the barn and escaped out the doors in the nick of time. For his 10th birthday his dad let him drive the 10-20 International tractor with lug wheels, pulling a grain binder making bundles for shocking in preparation for threshing. Things looked up as he got in the 12 year age range when the family would saddle up the car and head to Carver on Saturday night for shopping, eating, listening to the weekly band concert, and doing what young boys liked to do in town. In 1932-1933 he lived next to the lake across from the church. In those drought years, they planted corn for silage where the water is today.

Curt was baptized at East Union and confirmed. He attended Sunday school in the church before services on Sunday mornings, each class getting a row of pews. Confirmation was with Pastor Idstrom, whose grandson will be preaching here in July, and he also remembers being very nervous the day they were confirmed. He held many positions within the congregation as council member, cemetery custodian, and along with Lyle Burfield were the permanent ushers for a number of years.

Some other church memories include gathering at the cemetery in the spring after the ground firmed up with as may of the congregation that could make it and spend the day raking and cleaning up. Esther, Curt's wife, seems to remember the women raking and the men leaning on their rakes talking farming. A pot luck lunch was enjoyed by all. He also remembered the Centennial Historical Pageant held on the 100th anniversary of the church. It was written by Anita Hurtig and Pastor Linnerson's wife. It began in the uninhabited wilderness with little girls as flowers and bees, Indians, early settlers and how they survived, gathering in homes to worship, arrival of Peter Carlson and the beginning of the church and the becoming a church family.


East Union History-cont'd

Curt followed this beautiful memory with one of the Lutefisk dinners. Don't know if that is a good or bad memory.

He attended school at #4 just west of their farm for 3 years and then moved to the East Union school for the next 2 years. His mom dressed him in short pants the first day in this new school, guess what his nickname became. He finished grade school back at #4 and then on to the high school at Waconia. In 1948 he married Esther Carlson and moved to farm across from the church where Paul now lives. He farmed all his life and can still be seen on one of Paul's tractors in the spring and fall. Curt and Esther have 4 children, Kevin, Carol, Paul, and Jean who have given them 8 grand children and 10 great grand children.

50 years before Curt was born on the before mentioned farm, it was owned by Peter Nelson and the farm Curt lived on during his farming years was owned by Peter Carlson. Both Peters were original members of the church. Peter's son Caleb married Peter's daughter Anna joining the two farms together. In the 1960's Curt lived on the Peter Carlson farm and his brother Wayne lived on the Peter Nelson farm joining the same two farms together again 80 years later. Two different families and the same two farms.
