### Words from Pastor Bryant

Dear disciples,

I spent a few years living in the southeast portion of Wisconsin. Nestled right up against Lake Michigan, winters in Milwaukee involved enormous amounts of snow. And while the lake made falls warmer and springs cooler, it also provided an odd phenomenon throughout winter.

On many a morning, there would be a gorgeous sunrise. Brilliant in colors, bright in light—in the darkness of winter it was a welcome sight each day. And yet, there was always a cover of clouds it would slip behind mere hours after its arrival.

Throughout the day, the region languished in hues of gray—the brilliance of the sun having since slipped away. And yet, on those very same days, for the final hour or so of daylight, the sun would slip beyond the distant bank of clouds and find a gap of blue sky that hovered above the horizon.

And for a brief moment, you were treated to a blazing fire of reds and oranges against the blue of the sky. The underbelly of the clouds transformed from dull gray to brilliant colors and light. And just as soon as it all began, the sun slipped below the horizon and night began.

December may have Christmas. March and April may have Lent. But, January and February? In the darkest and longest days of winter, they hold the Light. The Light born in the darkness. The world may feel gray and cold and dark right now, but each day we have opportunities and moments to glimpse the brilliance of Jesus' peace, grace, and love.

Lent may be near. Winter may be here. But, we can still celebrate. Why? Because Jesus is here—as the light piercing the darkness. And so we celebrate and give thanks to the One who claims us as his beloved!

### Scott Family History at East Union Lutheran Church

Pehr (Peter) Carlson was the 1<sup>st</sup> Pastor at EULC. He had a brother named Andrew John (AJ) Carlson.

AJ spent 3 years in Company H 9<sup>th</sup> Regiment during the civil war. AJ was instrumental in the founding of St. Ansgars Academy in 1862. Later St. Ansgars moved to St. Peter MN and became Gustavus Adolphus College. To support St. Ansgars Academy AJ started the Bevens Creek Milling Company (AJ first worked at the mill that was then owned by the Bevens Brothers). The mill was located just east of the Bevens creek bridge down the hill going south of East Union. The He was on the Board Of County Commissioners, served in the state legislature, school board member, active at EULC, Delegate to the Republican Party in 1894, Board of Directors of the Scandinavian Relief Association, President of the San Francisco Insurance Company, and was on the board of directors of Gustavus Adophus. He also owned the East Union Store and Post Office where he was Postmaster. In 1893 the post office closed. When his accounts were settled, the Government owed him 1 cent and sent him a bank draft in that amount; the smallest check issued by the US Government.

On September 16<sup>th</sup> 1865 he married Maria Wilson (Oleson). They had 7 children. Victor E., Lydia, Elsie, Levi, Carl, Ernest and Alice Jeanette.

Ernest began publishing the East Union News in 1893.

Lydia Married Frans Oskar Scott on December 10<sup>th</sup> 1899.

They has 6 children,

Rose (Johnson), Ivy (Edberg), Oswin, Violet (Soles), Beatrice (Hallin) and Chester.

Beatrice (married to Ernest Hallin) had 1 Son Scott. With Wife Carolyn they had 3 children, Carrie (Hron) Chris and Carl.

Oswin married Elenor Schleicher October 15<sup>th</sup> 1925. They had 5 children. Audree, Donald, Gerald, Shirley and Carol.

Gerald married Lois Dahlke June 22<sup>nd</sup> 1952. They had 3 children, Randy, Jamie and Terry. Randy with wife Peg have 2 daughters, Kelsey (Lundquist) and Lauren. Kelsey and Taylor Lundquist have 2 daughters, Nora and Grace. Jamie (Lori) have from a previous marriage 2 sons, Shane and Christopher. Shane has 1 son Hunter.

So for the Scott family it starts with AJ Carlson, next Lydia, Oswin, Gerald, Randy/Jamie/Terry, Kelsey/Lauren/Shane/Christopher, Hunter/Nora/Grace.

There are many more family connections with the Scott's, Edberg's, Sells, Sterbonic's and more.
