Words from Pastor Bryant

Dear Disciples,

Recipe from Barb Steers

(Bars provided by Barb for coffee hour on February 16)

Chocolate Peanut Butter Tart/Bars

Crust:

1½ cups graham cracker crumbs1/3 cup unsalted peanuts, chopped½ cup melted butter

Fudge Layer:

2 tbsp butter 1 cup semi-sweet real chocolate chips 1 tbsp water 1/4 cup powdered sugar

Filling:

1/3 cup powdered sugar
1/2 cup creamy peanut butter
1/4 cup softened butter
3 ounces softened cream cheese

Chocolate Drizzle:

1 tbsp butter2 tbsp semi-sweet real chocolate chips

In medium bowl stir together all crust ingredients. Press crust mixture evenly on bottom of 10 inch tart pan or 13x9 inch cake pan; refrigerate until firm (5-10 minutes). In one quart saucepan, combine 2 tablespoons butter, 1 cup chocolate chips and water. Cook over medium heat, stirring occasionally until melted (3-5 minutes). Remove from heat; stir in ½ cup powdered sugar until smooth. Spread fudge mixture over crust; set aside. In medium mixer bowl combine all filling ingredients. Beat at high speed, scraping bowl often, until light and fluffy (2-3 minutes). Spread peanut butter mixture over fudge layer. In one quart saucepan, combine 1 tablespoon butter and 2 tablespoons chocolate chips. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly until melted and smooth (2-3 minutes). Drizzle over filling. Cover; refrigerate at least 2 hours.

History of the EULC Community

This is a reprint of an article that Mike Coleman wrote many years ago.

BEGINNING OF THE INDIAN WAR

When you hear the story about the Indian uprising on August 20, 1862 that happened in Kandiyohi County you might wonder what has this to do with us in Carver County. The story begins with a traveling minister named Andrew Jackson who traveled to the Lundborg cabin for a service on that day. This cabin was centrally located among a few small farms in the West Lake area. What a joy it was to bring the good news to these people. All was fine and the sermon was completed when 7 year old Peter Broberg walked in with a troubled look on his face. He told us the Indians were at the Broberg cabins. He said they were acting strange. A wagon was brought for the women and children and the men walked. When A. P. Broberg arrived there was normal conversation between him and the Indians. Then at some kind a pre arranged signal, the Indians began shooting and killed everyone in the cabin. Then the Indians picked up their tomahawks and pursued the children, killed them and mutilated their bodies. Then the wagon carrying the women and small children arrived and the Indians attacked and murdered most of them. 14 bodies and 13 were dead.

How is this terrible story related to East Union. The Brobergs and Lundborgs have ties to West Union, with some buried in their cemetery. And secondly the minister that day was Andrew Jackson who ended up here as a pastor at West Union and had a hand in setting up the school we had here that became Gustavus College in St. Peter.

The third coincidence was, one of the people at the service that day was named Sven Oman. Sven and old man Lundborg, being older, walked slower and didn't arrive until after the attacks had begun. They were able to hide until after the attack was over. The interesting story here is that Sven and his family were able to hide in his cabin. He had built a fruit storage room under the cabin which was used to store produce from their garden. They hid there and later escaped and moved north of Minneapolis for a time and then to Carver County and became a member of East Union Church. His wife, son, daughter in law and their children are buried in our cemetery.

There is a monument at Monson Lake State Park in remembrance of this family that was murdered by Indians on that fateful day. The only survivor of the Broberg family was Peter, the little boy who interrupted the service on August 20.

Paul Lundborg researched and wrote a book called "Death of a Dream" in 2013. A copy of the book will be in our library if you would like to read about this terrible time on the Minnesota prairie.

St. Patrick's Day Fun Facts

St Patrick's Day is celebrated each year on March 17th. The day is the observation of the death of St Patrick, the patron saint of Ireland.

- 1. St Patrick was born in 385 AD in a place believed to be Banna Venta Berniae, a town in Roman Britain (his exact place of birth is however uncertain). He died during the fifth century in the year 461 AD at Saul, Downpatrick, Ireland.
- 2. St Patrick's Day commemorates the arrival of the Christianity in Ireland. It happened in the year 432.
- 3. At the age of 16, St Patrick was kidnapped and was taken to Ireland. He was kidnapped by a group of Irish raiders who were attacking his family's estate. He worked there for 6 years tending sheep and then escaped and became a priest.
- 4. St Patrick's Day is also known as the 'Feast of Saint Patrick' and the 'Day of the Festival of Patrick'. Patrick studied and received his training in the religion for more than 12 years after he escaped from the captivity of the Irish raiders.
- 5. Saint Patrick used a Shamrock (a young sprig of clover) to teach the pagans about the Holy Trinity. The shamrock is now the official flower of Ireland.



- 6. St Patrick's Day has been observed by the Irish as a religious holiday for more than 1,000 years.
- 14. Wearing green attire or shamrock is also a St Patrick's Day tradition. It is one of the Irish traditions to pinch someone who is not wearing green on the day.
- 18. St Patrick's Day is one of the most celebrated festivals in the world. St Patrick's Day parades began in North America in the 17th century but they did not spread to Ireland until the 20th century.
- 19. St Patrick's Day is not celebrated on March 17 when it falls within the Holy Week. The celebration of the Day is adjusted
