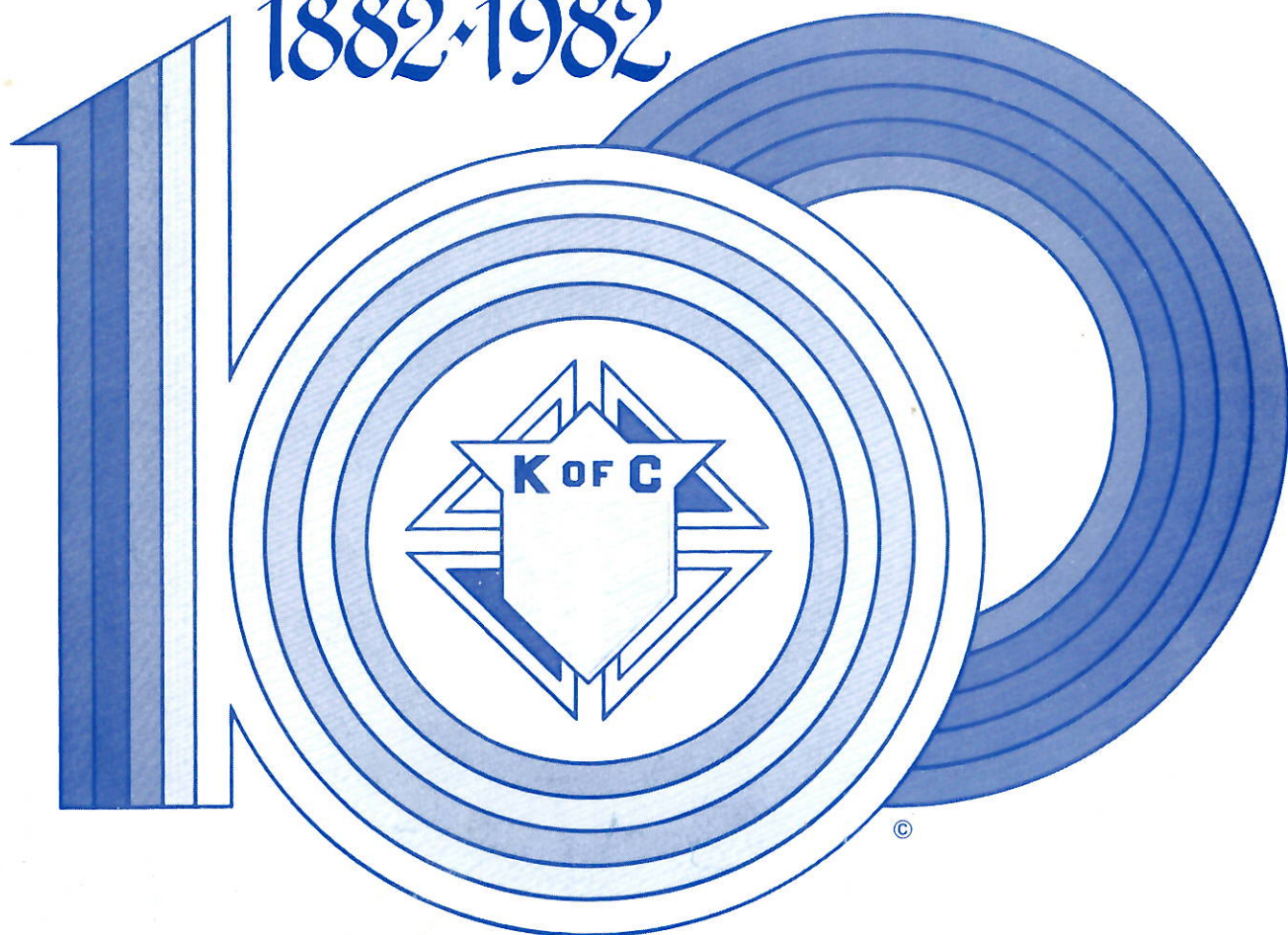

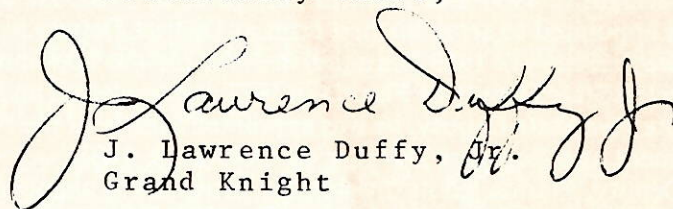
If the effort, time and dedication given to this convention by Mike Telesco and his committees are any indication, then your stay with us should be a memorable and festive occasion.

ALBERT V. FORTUNATO, SR.
Supreme Director
GUEST SPEAKER

Albert V. Fortunato, Sr. was born in Philadelphia, Pa. May 30, 1922. He was educated in the Parochial and Public school systems.

He enlisted in the United States Army Air Force in October, 1942 and served until February 1946. His last assignment was as an Occupational Counselor in a Separation Center.

He married the former Mary Elizabeth Wilder in Savannah, Georgia. They have two sons; Albert, Jr. and Michael. He has resided in Jacksonville, Fla. since 1946, where he owns and operates a business.

He joined the Knights of Columbus in February, 1947, accepted committee assignments and was elected to his first elected office as Outside Guard in 1949. He has served in every elected office of the Third and Fourth Degrees. He was elected Grand Knight in 1957 and Faithful Navigator in 1960. He also served the offices of Recorder and Faithful Scribe. He was appointed to serve his first term as District Deputy in 1960. He remained active on the State level and was elected State Secretary in 1969 and again in 1970. He was appointed and served two terms as State Program Director and was elected State Deputy of Florida in 1973 and re-elected and served until 1975. Upon the completion of serving as Immediate Past State Deputy, he was appointed Master of the Northern District of Florida, an office he held until his appointment as a Supreme Director on October 2, 1981.

As State Deputy, Florida led its division for two years in membership, allowing Florida to gain its tenth delegate. He also led the Order in instituting twelve Squires Circles in a single year. He was instrumental in the institution of the Basketball Free Throw contest, taking national honors the first year. He instituted the candy drive to raise funds to help the Mentally Retarded Citizens of Florida. During this period he instituted the State Vocations Program for the four dioceses of Florida. He was general chairman and state co-chairman of the 1975 Supreme Convention at Miami Beach, Florida.

He has served as President of the Holy Name Society six times in the two parishes he has resided in and is presently a Lay reader. He has served his diocese as a director and member of Catholic Charities. He serves his diocese as a lecturer at Pre Cana seminars. He has served as Director and received special recognition from the Duval Association for Retarded Citizens. He was recognized for his many years of work in Catholic scouting and was made an honorary Commissioner of Muskogee District of Duval County, Florida in 1967.

He has the honor of serving on two committees as a Supreme Director; the Youth Committee and the Committee to screen and find ways and means to rid the national television airways of programs coming into our homes that are not conducive to the continuation of sound Christian morals.

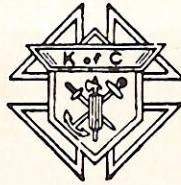

C., and this was followed two months later with one in Columbia. We received State Council status in 1921 with the chartering of Greenville. At the 1921 meeting of these three councils, Fred Bultman of Columbia was elected the first State Deputy. Since that time our State has grown to twenty-five councils with over 3500 members.

We are gathered here in Charleston, home of the first Council, 80 years ago, to celebrate the 100th Anniversary of our order. 100 years ago in New Haven, Connecticut, Fr. COUNCIL HISTORIES



CHARITY • UNITY • FRATERNITY •

REV. P.N. LYNCH COUNCIL 704, Charleston, S.C.
Date Chartered: October 26, 1902

Chartered Grand Knight: William Moran,

The times were not ordinary. The old order was changing. The Victorian Age was over and a new industrial was beginning.

The War Between the States had been over for thirty-seven years. Another war, although less violent and shorter duration, the Spanish-American, had ended. Bishop Lynch had been dead for twenty years.

In 1902, the Wright Brothers had not yet made their short but successful flight at Kittyhawk. Steam was the most useful energy source, but a few horseless carriages run by products derived from oil were beginning to appear on Charleston's streets.

The Supreme Council had been formed twenty years earlier and now councils were being started in the South. Organizations were not always viewed on favorably by Catholics at the turn of the century, primarily because of the anti-clerical attitudes fostered in Europe by many lay groups.

Monsignor Charles D. Wood was the only member of the Knights of Columbus in the state. He was, however, able to convince Bishop Northrop to join. Several priests and many laymen followed the bishop into our council.

Council 704 succeeded from the beginning. Membership grew rapidly. Within five years, the present council hall was built. Today in Charleston parlance, "The Hall" means the Columbus Hall.

Activities from the council's inception included religious, fraternal, charitable, youth, social and sports. Within many years later, the Supreme Council instituted the five and six point programs, 704 found itself already in compliance.

During the great depression, many councils became inactive and had to close their council homes. Despite limited financial resources, 704 managed to stay alive and "The Hall" never closed. A devastating fire on Thanksgiving night in 1947 caused the meetings and other activities to be held in the bowling alleys, but closing altogether was unthinkable.

During both world wars, the council initiated into its membership servicemen from all parts of the country. Many of them remained in the area and continue to belong.

Members of the council went to the aid of priests in the towns where anti-Catholic sentiment was strong. Their outstanding manifestation of loyalty and devotion to the church did much to dispel the hatred and mistrust of those who did not understand our religion.

For a great number of years during Lent, members of the council, as a group, attended Stations of the Cross in the various parishes in the area, visiting a different church each week.

At the annual retreats held in the hall, the Blessed Sacrament was brought in for the closing Benediction. It was very rare for that privilege to be granted during those times.

For perhaps forty years, relay races that attracted spectators were sponsored by the council. For the last twenty years, marathon type runs have been held that have attracted many more participants, if but slightly fewer spectators.

From the beginning of flight to the age of space shuttles, our council has survived. "It was the best of times and it was the worst of times."

Four score years of war and peace; love and hate; joy and sadness; riches and poverty; prejudice and brotherhood; faith and unbelief; yet, through it all, the principles on which our council was founded remain, viz, Charity, Unity, Fraternity, and Patriotism. And it is to these benign disciplines that we must continue to address ourselves for the next eighty years — and more.

To the founders of our council, we owe a great debt. We are proud to be their heirs and to have a binding affinity with them, not always kinship. Where they have lived, we live; their people are our people; their faith, our faith; and their God, our God.

BISHOP ENGLAND COUNCIL 724, Columbia, S.C.
Date Chartered: January 25, 1903

Chartered Grand Knight:

Bishop England Council 724 held their first meetings in Brown's Hall on Main Street, later moving to the second floor of Ed Jenkin's store on Sumter Street. In 1920, the present St. Peter's School was erected and the Knights moved to this location and shared the facilities with the school. Among the facilities were a swimming pool, basketball court and handball court.

In 1928, our Silver Jubilee was celebrated by a strong and active council. The Depression followed and our ranks became depleted. Due to the growth of the parochial school, we lost the use of the facilities at the St. Peter's location. The situation became critical and in 1937 we were visited by a representative of the Supreme Council who arrived

with the intention of revoking our Charter. Under the leadership of Thomas Fickling the Council took new directions and began meeting in a room in the rear of St. Francis de Sales Church. Meetings were held there until 1941, when a group of six men put up their own money to open a hall on the 1600 block of Main Street. We remained there from 1942, until the early part of 1946. Under the guidance of GK Francis Sutton, DGK James Wainscott, and Trustees John Bultman, John Carter and Norbert Theodore, a sum of \$28,000.00 was raised, sufficient to buy and repair our present home at 1328 Blanding Street. The home was dedicated in October 1946. A Corporation was formed and chartered by the State of South Carolina and the title of the property was placed with this corporation. Funds for the purchase and repair of our present home came from funds generated from this corporation.

On January 24th and 25th, 1954, the 50th Anniversary was marked by a Golden Jubilee Celebration held at the Hotel Jefferson in Columbia.

Due to the continued growth of the Council and the need for expansion to meet the ever-growing needs of the Council, it was decided in 1955 to construct an addition to the Council Home. The \$30,000.00 addition, now known as Phil Morgan Hall, nearly doubled the area, permitting dances, dinners, bingo, and a meeting hall.

Council 724, being located in the middle or center of the State has been a focal point for many State activities over the years. Due to its easy accessibility, state meetings, Conventions, Athletic Tournaments, as well as the Annual Bishop's Raffle Drawing have been and will continue to be hosted by Bishop England Council No. 724 as scheduling permits. Members have seen participation in both social and charitable events at our Council Home, among which have been: sponsoring of wheelchairs for needy individuals, the Andy Ryan Scholarship Fund at Cardinal Newman High School, and the Tootsie Roll Campaign for Retarded Children complete with a special Christmas Party for the children. It was participation of members of Council 724 that established the Navigator Corporation which resulted in the building of Christopher Towers, a high rise, low cost rental home for the elderly of the area.

The future offers many challenges for the Knights of Columbus in South Carolina, as well as for Bishop England Council. As in the past we will rise up united and meet these challenges head on. The Council has and will continue to live up to the principles of Unity, Fraternity, Charity and Patriotism, the cornerstones of the Knights of Columbus.

BISHOP NORTHROP COUNCIL 2207, Sumter, S.C.

Date Chartered: 1922

Chartered Grand Knight: C. A. McGrath

Council #2207 was named in honor of Bishop Northrop, who was the Bishop of South Carolina in Charleston. Council #2207 was the fourth council formed in the state of South Carolina.

Al J. Baumann from Council #2207 was a State Deputy of South Carolina as is the current State Deputy, James P. Nettles.

Council #2207 purchased 3¼ acres on Highway 521 in October 1967 and a building was moved on the property in January, 1970.

Aluminum siding was applied to the building in Spring of 1979.

Helped the St. Anne's Church and school by providing members to run their Bingo games for two years.

The Council participated in the Tootsie Roll Drive these few years, and each year the collection was greater than the previous year. This is a fund for the retarded children of the community.

These last 3 years the Bishop's Raffle Drive was greater than our quota. This year we have had the greatest year. Most of the members participated.

Bishop Northrop Council #2207 hosted its only South Carolina State Annual Convention in April, 1961.

Council #2207 holds its annual summer picnic at Lake Marion in July of each year.

Council #2207 is hosting boys and girls softball teams. This is its second year.

Council #2207 has hosted state bowling tournaments for two years now. It was a success and enjoyed by all the participants.

A memorial mass is scheduled each year in November for all its deceased members.

JOSEPH MIGUEL ROS COUNCIL 3067, Georgetown, S.C.

Date Chartered: June 28, 1947

Chartered Grand Knight: Greg R. Duffy

CHARTERED AS "GEORGETOWN COUNCIL NO. 3067", changed by Resolution in honor of Brother Ros, who died March 28, 1980.

Greg R. Duffy recruited six men in 1946, with a shrimp supper at the restaurant near the railroad crossing at Front & Fraser Street. Kelly & Louis Khoury (brothers) owned the restaurant, which became the meeting place for the developing Knights of Columbus Council initiated by this small group. Kelly, with years of experience as Mess Sergeant in the Army, still serves as a loved and respected Lecturer for the Council and many other special events in the community. The charter contains the names of (54) members. Father John Steigner was succeeded as Chaplain by Father Albert A. Faase. For a time, meetings were held upstairs over Maloney's Jewelry store, now Diana Shop. The Morgan Home, an historic home of Georgetown's mayor (now St. Mary's Rectory and Nursery) was bequeathed to St. Mary's Parish, serving as the Convent for the Dominican Sisters of Adrian, Michigan, who staffed the first parochial school. Father Faase led the brother Knights in constructing additional classroom buildings, a garage and fundraising through the annual local Mardi Gras and outfitting St. Mary's championship Drum and Bugle Corps, directed by Mr. W. W. Jacobus. Our Council is known as the right arm of St. Mary's, also assisting Father Vogel, founder of St. Cyprians; Father O'Sullivan, founder of Tara Hall Home for Boys, as well as lending support to Sarah Haven Home for Girls, Kidney Foundation and Association for Retarded Citizens. The Council Home, 711 Highmarket Street, was

built in 1960. Masses were held there during a year long renovation of St. Mary's Church. Memorial services in honor of 33 deceased Knights of this Council. Nineteen members have served as Grand Knight.

BISHOP IGNATIUS A. REYNOLDS COUNCIL 3684, Aiken, S.C.

Date Chartered: July 19, 1953

Chartered Grand Knight: Paul J. Hage

Our Council was initially comprised of forty two men. The title was deemed appropriate as the formation was also the 100th anniversary of St. Mary Help of Christians Church and in 1853 the Right Reverend Ignatius A. Reynolds was the Bishop of Charleston.

St. Mary's Pastor, Right Reverend Msgr. George Lewis Smith, an enthusiastic knight of long standing and first Chaplain, assisted materially in guiding the council until 1980 when he was succeeded by the present Chaplain, Reverend Bonaventure Brown.

Proceeds from the operation of a golf driving range from 1955 through 1957 enabled the council to rent a house in Aiken mansion as its first council home. This accomplishment was facilitated by John J. Cunning, Sr., still a devoted and beloved Brother Knight.

In March of 1956, the council obtained a certificate of incorporation as the Columbus Club. All eventual obligations associated with the financing and ownership of our council homes have been conducted under this charter.

On November 25, 1960, a charter was issued whereby our Fourth Degree assembly was formed with Joseph Monahan, Jr., a charter member of the council, installed as its first Faithful Navigator. He later served honorably as Master, De Soto Province, South Carolina District.

The first council home was purchased in 1961. By 1966, a growing membership and expanding activities clearly indicated the need for a new home specifically designed for council activities. The formal opening of the present home was held in March, 1968.

Our council has won many awards, such as Star Council, Membership and other citations for achievement. It has been outstanding in charitable programs on the State and local level. It instituted, and hosted for many years, the Knights of Columbus State Golf Tournament which is now hosted state wide. Our council has hosted the 35th, 40th, and 47th state conventions. It provided South Carolina with its Past State Deputy, Richard S. Sullivan, Sr., and its present State Treasurer, Gilbert B. Thomas.

The original nucleus of forty two men has grown to two hundred and fifty members with the prediction of continued growth in membership and all other aspects of our fraternal activity.

MICHAEL O'CONNOR COUNCIL 5026, Beaufort, S.C.

Date Chartered: August 20, 1960

Chartered Grand Knight: Francis L. Pulliam

Formation of a council in Beaufort was approved at the South Carolina State Convention in 1960.

A committee, composed of Francis Pulliam, George Wilkinson, Walter Stephenson and Emil Cataldo, was formed to ramrod the formation.

Dr. Edward Van de Griff, State Deputy, appointed Brother James Stedman of Charleston District Deputy. District Deputy Stedman oversaw the formation of the new Council.

The council was instituted on 20 August 1960. A First Degree was held for 42 members at St. Peter's Parish by the Charleston (Council 704) Team. The new council was instituted with 64 members 37 Insurance members and 27 Associate members. This Council brought the total number of Councils in South Carolina to seven.

The 2nd and 4th Thursdays of each month were designated as meeting nights. Time of meetings: 8:00 p.m.

Father Anderson, Pastor of St. Peter's Church, suggested the Council be named in memory of Michael O'Connor who built and donated the present St. Peter's Church to the Diocese of Charleston.

The Charter was presented to the Council on 9 February 1961 by Bishop Paul J. Hallinan, Bishop of Charleston, at a dinner at the Sea Island Motel.

Michael O'Connor Council hosted the South Carolina State Convention in May 1962.

The Council held Michael O'Connor Day on 17 April 1977 with Mass at St. Peter's Church, Ceremony at Michael O'Connor's grave and a Social and Dinner at the Council Home. A plaque in memory of Michael O'Connor was placed in St. Peter's Church by the Council. Some relatives of Michael O'Connor were honored guests.

Michael O'Connor Council hosted the South Carolina State Convention in April-May 1977.

First Council Home was the present St. Peter's Convent on Pigeon Point Road. Sold building bonds to pay for renovation of the building. Moved from this building in July 1961.

Second Council Home was on second floor at 208 Carteret Street.

Council approved the construction of a new Council Home on 26 April 1962.

Third and current Council Home on Ribaut Road - Moved into building in August 1962. Building Blessed Sacrament. Dedicated 15 April 1963 by Bishop Reh (Bishop of Charleston). Council Home renovated and enlarged in 1977.

Hall dedicated to the memory of our departed members. The Club Room was named "Nick Peschi Lounge" in honor of Brother Dominick Peschi.

FATHER ANTHONY MONTISINOS Council 5086, Myrtle Beach, S.C.

Date Chartered: February 1, 1961

Chartered Grand Knight: John R. W.

Father Anthony Montisinos Council #5086, Myrtle Beach, S.C. was formally organized on February 1, 1961.

MSGR. CHARLES DU BOIS WOOD COUNCIL 5194, Florence, S.C.
Date Chartered: October 8, 1961

Chartered Grand Knight: John L. Sullivan

Twenty-one years of service to the city of Florence and surrounding communities, the Knights of Columbus have well established their membership here. This Council has had its hard times, same as others, but as a united group the member Knights have made the council a strong one.

One of the biggest accomplishments was in 1975 when Jimmy Burch became the first black Grand Knight of Council 5194, Florence, South Carolina. he was a tremendous asset to our Council.

We at Council 5194 wish every other council a Happy and Progressive 100th Anniversary.

FR. MAURICE R. DALY COUNCIL 6076, Spartanburg, S.C.
Date Chartered: June 8, 1968

Chartered Grand Knight: Melvin F. Thompson

Council #6076 was chartered on June 8, 1968 after having been a sub-Council of the Greenville Council for a year and a half. The Council was formed with forty-two charter Knights; its present membership is 195 Knights and it is still growing. As its name the Council chose the name of a former long time pastor of St. Paul the Apostle Church. It is the home council for all Knights living in Spartanburg, Union and Cherokee counties.

The Council acquired a rented house in 1970 after having held its meetings, events, etc. for a year and a half in garages, restaurants, church halls, etc. After six months of painting, paneling, a new furnace and numerous other repairs, the Council finally had a presentable place to call home. It wasn't the best, but it was home. It was the gray stone building on S. Pine Street, across from the Y.M.C.A.

In the latter part of 1975 the Elk's Club, (six miles out S. Pine Street), was put up for sale. After much pocket and soul searching, the Council membership voted unanimously to take the plunge. After seven years of life the Council, and the bank, owned its own home. The home was just about everything we were looking for; a lounge, office space, game room, large professional kitchen, good sized hall and three and a half acres. It sits on the left side of South Pine Street, on top of the second rise after S. Pine becomes two lanes. It is ten minutes from Main Street. With the large K of C sign, (lighted at night), on a roadside pole, you can't miss it. In January of 1979 a faulty gas valve caused a fire which did extensive damage. With the aid of our insurance policy about one half of the home received a much needed renovation.

Council meetings are on the first and third Wednesday of each month, at 8 P.M. Officers' meetings are on the fourth Wednesday, also at 8. In addition to the regular meetings there are numerous social events, such as: steak nites, family dinner nites, dances, parties, etc. throughout the year. Advance notice of all activities is given, either in the monthly newsletter, "The Knightline", by special flyer, or by phone.

The Council also runs a Bingo each Tuesday evening, at 8 P.M. at the home.

In addition to the above events, the Council sponsors a Blood Bank Program for Knights and their immediate families, school essay contests, needy family Christmas baskets, senior citizen dinners, a scholarship program for Catholic students graduating from a high school in Spartanburg, Union or Cherokee counties, and a "Operation Identification" program for the residents of Spartanburg. On a state-wide level, the Council participates in charity car raffle and a "Tootsie Roll" campaign for the benefit of the retarded. On the national level, the Knights offer a complete insurance program and a student loan program.

POPE JOHN XXIII COUNCIL 6250, Charleston, S.C.
Date Chartered: September 12, 1970

Chartered Grand Knight: William J. Kanapaux, Jr.

Pope John XXIII, Council 6250 was charted on September 12, 1970 as the result of an expansion movement in the West Ashley area of Charleston.

District Deputy Edward L. Nutter, Jr. (now the Assistant Director of Agencies for the K of C) under the direction of State Deputy Douglas Kerrigan of Greenville, appointed James L. Crowe and William J. Kanapaux of CL. 704 as the

formation committee.

Initial meetings were held at Blessed Sacrament Church and the final formation included members from Blessed Sacrament, St. Joseph's, Nativity and St. John The Beloved, Summerville and Divine Redeemer, Hanahan.

Charter Grand Knight was William J. Kanapaux, Deputy Grand Knight Joseph Moran and Financial Secretary James L. Crowe. Initial membership was 69.

After rotating meetings at various parishes the Council met at the Joe Ford Realty Building for the first year, then rented quarters for 2 years prior to purchasing a council home on Highway 61. Subsequent formations of council in Summerville and Hanahan caused CL 6250 to sell their home and temporarily move to Nativity Parish for council meetings, until a new home can be secured.

During the last twelve years the Council has won many Supreme and State Awards along with providing State Deputies, a State Secretary, State Advocate, three District Deputies and a General Insurance Agent.

FLOWERTOWN COUNCIL 6629, Summerville, S.C.

Date Chartered: November 20, 1974

Chartered Grand Knight: Orion P. D. Canant

Membership in the Council numbered 46 with 21 of them being new members.

Elected to office for the new organization were — Grand Knight, Orion P. D. Canant; Deputy Grand Knight, P. N. Froble; Chancellor, Edward Redman; Recorder, Douglas Moore; Treasurer, James Meyers; Advocate, Thomas Hayes; Warden, James Gardener. Guards are John Ott and John Connerty. Trustees are James Teodosio, Robert Scott, and Francis LaRocque. Eugene Johnk was appointed by the Supreme Council as the organization's Financial Secretary.

The officers were installed during mass on Sunday, December 15 at St. John the Beloved Church in Summerville. The mass was concelebrated by Msgr. Madden and the Rev. Thomas R. Duffy, VG, who was the State Chaplain of the Knights of Columbus.

Presiding over the installation was the Worthy District Deputy Joseph E. Moran and assisted by his Warden William R. Mitchum. Participating in the ceremony was the Color Guard of the Fourth Degree General Assembly from Charleston.

Flowertown Council 6629 of Summerville has since its beginning followed the principles of the Knights of Columbus — Charity, Unity, Fraternity, and Patriotism.

The Knights of this Council have and still help their community. We are charitable to the needs of the people who live around the Council.

Since the founding of Summerville Council, we have increased to the present number of 161 Brother Knights who work for the Catholic Church, the order of the Knights of Columbus, and the good of all our brothers.

We, the officers and members, are proud to be a part of the 100th year of the Knights of Columbus.

DONALD J. GODFREY COUNCIL 6726, Hanahan, S.C.

Date Chartered: November 20, 1975

Chartered Grand Knight: George Williams

Although the Donald J. Godfrey Council is one of the younger councils in South Carolina, it is by no means one of the least. Having been chartered on November 20, 1975, it began its move to gain recognition — and move it on. From its first meeting in the VFW Club to the Minute Man Club of the U.S. Army Depot to a classroom at St. Thomas the Apostle, and finally back to the Divine Redeemer School Hall where it continues to hold its meetings each First and Third Thursday of the month.

Having gleaned its members from four different parishes and three different U.S. Navy and Air Force Chapels, its membership is in an ever state of change though always carrying out very clearly the fundamentals of our order: Duty to God and Country.

Growth; however, is not easy in such an environment and because of this, Council achievements although great are impressive. Having been awarded the Star Council Award in 1980-81 Fraternal Year and well on its way earning it again in Fraternal Year 1981-82. It also has been awarded the Founder's Award five years in succession and the Father McGinney Award three times.

Its works of charity and its contributions to the needy each holiday season have been highly successful and most enjoyable for all who participated. Its most successful and rewarding campaign has to be the Annual Tooth Roll Drive for retarded citizens. Through the efforts of its members, the Donald J. Godfrey Council has contributed approximately \$10,000 towards the work done at such places as Camp High Hope, the Mary K. Center and the Holy Center.

In this the 100th year of the Knights of Columbus, the Donald J. Godfrey Council #6726 has dedicated itself to achieve its 100th member and more to find a place, a home, so that it can truly carry out the principle of duty to surrounding communities in the North Area.

EDISTO COUNCIL 6891, Orangeburg, S.C.

Date Chartered: March 6, 1977

Chartered Grand Knight: Francis E. LaRocque

Edisto Council 6891 was founded on March 6, 1977 with 43 chartered members, under the leadership of Francis E. LaRocque, the first Grand Knight who was primarily instrumental in the founding of Council 6891.

During the first year of Edisto Council's operation, we were able to attend the State Convention which was held

at Hilton Head Island, participated in the Tootsie Roll Campaign and the Bishop's Raffle. The council initiated monthly pot-luck suppers for the families of the brother knights which showed a great deal of success.

In the year 1978, Ronald K. Huber was elected by his brother knights to serve as Grand Knight of Council 6891. The council banner was obtained during Grand Knight Huber's term. The council voted and established the "Columbian Club" as our building fund club, one day we are hoping to be able to either buy or build our Council home.

In 1979, the brothers of Council 6891 elected Ivan W. Wade, Jr. as Grand Knight. However, due to unforeseen opportunities, Ivan only served as Grand Knight for six months, before he moved to another state. In January of 1980, Michael J. Toto, who had been the Deputy Grand Knight under Ivan was raised to the office of Grand Knight. This position he held until June 1981. The American flag was presented to the Council by Sir Knight John B. Gibson during this period. Under the leadership of Grand Knight Michael Toto, Council 6891 won for the years 1980 and 1981, the "Retarded Citizens Award."

In 1981, Sir Knight John B. Gibson was elected to serve as Grand Knight. A dynamic source of energy, Grand Knight Gibson made two pledges to his brother knights: (1) that the treasury of the council would grow; and (2) that the council would become more involved in church related activities. As of March, 1982, both of these pledges have been fulfilled.

Our membership has grown and our future looks bright.

THE CITADEL COUNCIL 6900, Charleston, S.C.

Date Chartered: March 13, 1977

Chartered Grand Knight: William Moore

We started with close to 60 members and today we have seen more than 300 members in our council. The Citadel is the only military college council in the United States and the world. At the time of being chartered the phone number of our council was 792-6900 and being very close to this council number, the Supreme Council decided to give us that number, and Council 6900 was born.

During the last five years we have dedicated ourselves with the task of helping our chapel and our community by helping or sponsoring as many activities as we have been able to fit in the close schedule of cadet life. This year we had certified, for the first time, our own First Degree Team and we had the first new First Degree in the State. Today we are the fastest growing council in the state (being the first one to achieve the Century Club in the history of South Carolina) and being among the top five college councils in membership in the United States, Vivat Jesus!

CHARLES TILGHMAN COUNCIL 7122, North Myrtle Beach, S.C.

Date Chartered: May 21, 1978

Chartered Grand Knight: James Stoffel

Four years ago State Chaplain Reverend Peter Bererich, this council's first Chaplain, gathered 32 followers of Columbus and with the help of, then District Deputy, Jim Nettles, Council #7122 was chartered. Membership has increased and the Knights of North Myrtle Beach are actively involved in the principles of the Order. As a relatively new council we are short on history, but have already received a Star Council Award, a Founders Award and the Columbian Award twice. Within the council there is a core of dedicated hard working Knights who will be heard from as our history is made.

FR. JOHN B. ADAIR COUNCIL 7129, Greenwood, S.C.

Date Chartered: June 11, 1978

Chartered Grand Knight: Charles E. Lober

Council chartered with 36 members, and as of February 1982 has 68 members. Since its formation, 2 brothers have died. Council meets at the Church Hall of Our Lady of Lourdes at Greenwood, not having its own home. The activities of the Council therefore are closely related to general church functions. The Council sponsors the Church Softball and Basketball youth teams; supplies the manpower to run monthly bingos at the church; sponsors Marianist devotion and Nocturnal Adoration.

The Council is named after the Rev. John B. Adair, a native of Charleston, S.C., who served at one time as pastor at Our Lady of Lourdes. He was an avid golfer, and was affectionately known as "Arnie". Although he enjoyed things of this world, one was immediately aware of the spiritual presence in him. His untimely death was a great loss to the Church on earth.

From its very beginnings Council 7129 was blessed with active and devoted members. This is evidenced by the many noteworthy achievements of this Council in its short duration. . .Viz:

- 1) Received Star Council Award 1978-1979 and 1979-1980.
- 2) State Scrap Book Award 1979 and 1980.
- 3) 1978-1979 Membership Award — 2,000% gain.
- 4) Community Activity Award 1980.
- 5) 1st Place State Bowling Tournament 1980.

In addition, Council 7129 has had its own degree team for the past 3 years, and recently purchased its own robes for this ceremonial. Recent audit shows the Council to be financially sound.

At the urging of Fr. Henry Burke, and through the efforts of the Myrtle Beach Council and their District Deputy James Nettles, the Charles Andrew Smith Council was chartered on March 16, 1980. On that Sunday, 32 candidates received their honors of membership. Participating in the ceremony, as well as being charter members, were 10 former knights.

Charles A. Smith was the first child baptized at St. James Church and was the church's first altar boy. He had drowned several years earlier in a swimming accident. Charles was the son of the Council's first Grand Knight, Marion E. Smith.

Although a young Council, in age and spirit, they have not been idle. Some accomplishments have been: scheduling of the lecturers, ushers, and altar boys for St. James Church; helping in Special Olympics, held annually at Coastal Carolina College and participating in the annual "Tootsie Roll" sale and Bishop's Raffle. By way of family entertainment, they have organized and sponsored Sunday breakfasts, St. Patrick's Day parties, Christmas parties, and family picnics. They hold a monthly Rosary Service for the parishoners and sponsor the church-league softball team.

On a sadder note, the Council has participated in three funerals for non-Knight families.

Council 7531 has the honor of having the first Certified First Degree Team in the state other than Citadel Council. The degree team has conducted First Degree ceremonies in Conway, Georgetown, Florence, and Myrtle Beach.

The Council sponsored a Columbus Day talk show on a local radio station and has participated in the Centennial Celebration. Mayor Kenneth Holt recognized the Knights of Columbus by proclaiming March 25-31 as Knights of Columbus Week in Conway.

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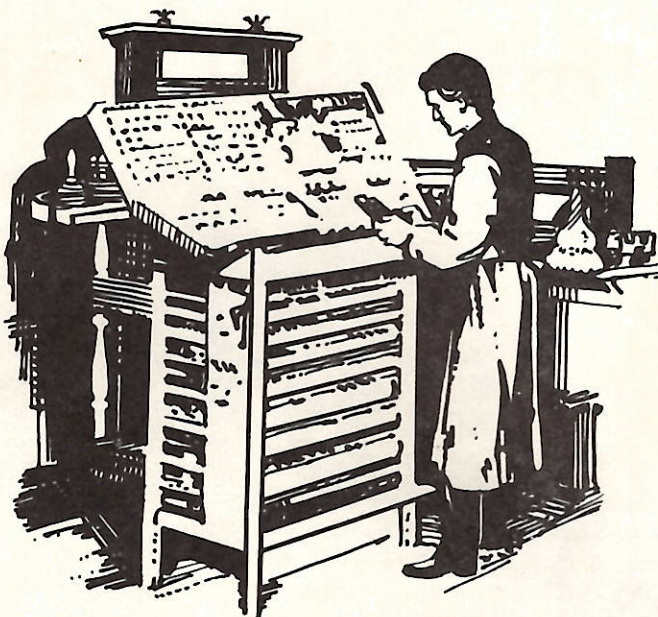

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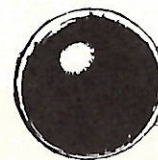

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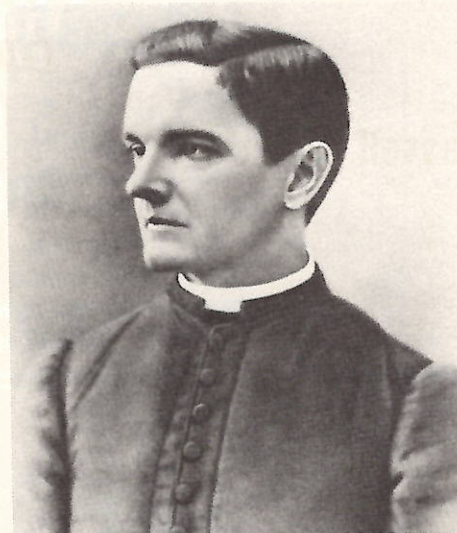
